

As you can see from the Newsletter Annual Accounts, we made a small profit of £228.30 which was due to some very shrewd purchasing by Paula as there was a significant increase in the cost of ink and paper in 2022/2023. Thankfully, prices have started to fall, and we are pleased to confirm that (yet again 😊) there will be no increase to the cost of advertising and sponsorship.

The newsletter team would like to take this opportunity to thank everyone who advertised and sponsored the newsletter over the past 12 months for their financial support and all of our kind contributors and those who deliver the newsletter (whatever the weather!!), without whom, the newsletter could not continue.

RUDSTON HISTORY

To start our new feature, we travel back in time to the Roman Times and then take a look at the village in 1892. Next issue, we focus on the Monolith. If you have memories to share, we would love to hear about them.

Roman Origins

These early Britons have left behind traces of their occupation of the district. In the neighbourhood of the churchyard are seven "long barrows" - the sepulchral mounds of the earliest or long-headed Britons. Two of these were opened in 1869, by Canon Greenwell and other gentlemen. One barrow was 66 feet in diameter, and the other was 78 feet, both being five or six feet in height. The examination showed that the original interments had been destroyed by later burials, burnt and unburnt. In one was found a double cist, formed of oolitic sandstone, which had evidently been used for very important burials. Skeletons, both male and female, were found in different parts of the mounds, and with each were a drinking-cup and implements of bone and flint. An urn of the "food-vessel type," ornamented with zigzag markings, and a bronze awl were found near the body of a woman. Other articles of burnt and unburnt pottery were obtained. The later burials were those of the brachycephalic or round-headed Britons.

The Roman Road from York to Bridlington passed through the parish, and many Roman relics, consisting of urns, swords, spears, &c., have been dug up. In 1838, a tessellated pavement was discovered in a field on the left of the road leading to Kilham. It was about nine feet long by four feet broad, and was composed of tesseræ, an inch square; red, blue, and grey in colour.

All Saint Church - Historical Information from 1892

The church, which bears the Saxon dedication of All Saints, is a beautiful edifice of stone in the Norman and Decorated styles. The tower, which is the earliest part of the Church, is early Norman, erected circa 1050. The chancel dates from 1280, and the naves and aisles were rebuilt about 1330. The Church was repaired in 1829, and again thoroughly restored and richly decorated in memory of Matilda Bosville at a cost of £2,000.

The east wall of the chancel is richly decorated with a reredos, a window of four lights, and three elegant two-light windows. The north and south walls are also decorated with stained-glass windows. The aisles are separated from the nave by three pointed arches springing from circular pillars, and the east windows of the south aisle and north aisle are memorials to the late Lord and Lady Macdonald and Richard Beaumont erected by their children. A monument to James William Bosville Macdonald, general in the army, is located on the north wall of the chancel. He was born at Thorpe Hall and lies buried in the churchyard.

The font, a very fine piece of Norman work, is at the west end of the south aisle, and a hagioscope can be seen from the north chapel. The Church was lighted by electricity conveyed by wires from Thorpe Hall. The organ was added in 1888 at a cost of £1,500. It is elevated upon eight pillars of wood and is connected by electric pneumatic action with the organ.

In the churchyard is a monolith and an ancient British cist-vaen, dug out of a tumulus between Rudston and Burton Agnes by Canon Greenwell, in 1869, and placed here in 1871.

The Vicarage had 261 acres of land and was gifted by the Archbishop of York. The chapels in the Village belonged to the Wesleyans (built 1876) and Primitive Methodists (1879). The school was erected in 1858 and a parish library had 700 volumes.

VILLAGE BINGO

The village bingo will be in aid of the playing field this year as no other organisation has come forward to benefit from the bingo.

The work of Paula and her team of volunteers as well as all those who support the bingo is much appreciated.

Rudston's Recipes

MARROW CHUTNEY

Ingredients

- 1.5kg/3lb 5oz marrow, peeled and deseeded
- 225g shallot, sliced
- 225g apple, peeled, cored and sliced
- 225g sultana
- 2cm piece ginger, finely chopped
- 225g demerara sugar
- 850ml malt vinegar
- 12 black peppercorns

Method

- Cut the marrow into small pieces, put in a bowl and sprinkle liberally with 2 tbsp salt. Cover and leave for 12 hrs.
- Rinse and drain the marrow, then place in a preserving pan or large saucepan with the shallots, apples, sultanas, ginger, sugar and vinegar. Tie the peppercorns in muslin (or put into a small enclosed tea strainer) and place in the pan. Bring to the boil, then reduce the heat and simmer, stirring from time to time, until the consistency is thick.
- Leave to settle for 10 mins, then spoon into sterilised jars, put on the lids and label.

Will keep for a year in a cool, dark place.

FUDGY FIG ROLL

Ingredients

- | | |
|------------------------------|-----------------------------|
| 140g soft dried fig, chopped | 120g wholemeal flour |
| 1 medium very ripe banana | 1 tsp bicarbonate of soda |
| knob of butter, for greasing | 1 tsp ground cinnamon |
| 3 large eggs, separated | good grating fresh nutmeg * |
| 225g light muscovado sugar | 4 tbsp golden caster sugar |

Filling

- 300ml double cream
- 4 tbsp icing sugar, sifted
- about 250-300g fig jam or conserve

* optional

Method

- Cover the figs with boiling water in a bowl and set aside to soften for 30 mins. Drain and mash well with the banana.
- Heat oven to 190°C/170°C fan/gas 5. Grease a Swiss roll tin - about 34 x 24cm. Line the base with baking parchment.
- Separate the eggs, collecting the whites in a large clean bowl. Beat with an electric whisk until stiff peaks hold on the end of your whisk, then add half the sugar and beat until thick and glossy.
- In another mixing bowl, beat the yolks with the remaining sugar until pale. Whisk in the mashed fig mixture. Fold this mixture into the meringue mixture until well combined. Mix the flour, bicarbonate of soda, spices and a pinch of salt. Sprinkle it over the wet mixture and very gently fold in, again until well combined. Gently scrape and spread the batter into the tin. Bake for 12-15 mins until springy to the touch.
- Meanwhile, lay a clean tea towel on the bench (this helps keep the cake nice and moist). Scatter the caster sugar over the towel, flip on the cake, peel off the parchment, then roll up from the shortest side with the tea towel into a Swiss roll. Lift onto a wire rack to cool completely.
- Unroll the cake gently. Using electric beaters, whisk the cream and icing sugar together to soft peaks. Spread the fig jam over the cake, followed by the cream. Roll up again and slice to serve.

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


Calling all community leaders,

would you like to learn how you can contribute to making your communities safer?

With Community in Motion training, you can learn how to become active bystanders in your community so you can help to play an active role in preventing violence against women and girls.

The aim of this training is to raise awareness of gender-based violence in England and Wales and to equip you with tools and strategies to safely support/challenge others if you witness something that isn't right in your community.

This approach for violence prevention focuses on boys and men not as perpetrators or potential perpetrators, but as empowered bystanders who can confront abusive peers and support abused ones. Likewise, the model focuses on girls and women not as victims or potential targets of harassment and abuse, but as empowered bystanders who can support abused peers and confront abusive ones.

The training is open to anyone who is interested. There are 20 places available, but additional dates will be added in response to demand.
