The Committee would like to thank everyone who came to the Organ and Choir Concert in Church on 21st July. Also, thanks to those who donated food, raffle prizes and donations, and helped at the event. It was a delight to see the choir stalls filled by the Choir from Beverley Minster in full Robes and the Church full with an appreciative audience.

Robert Poyser was excited about playing the Church organ only to find it would not work for him although Wendy Proctor had played it that morning for the service with no problems. Luckily, in his wisdom, Robert had brought his keyboard and made it sound like an organ to accompany and lead the Choir. The Choir sang various favourite pieces from their repertoire which everyone enjoyed. Robert was disappointed not to be able to play his solo pieces but offered to come back when the organ is in concert working order.

There were 45 in the choir and 105 in the audience. Everyone enjoyed tea and cake afterwards and remarked on how marvellous the choir are and what good value it was for the ticket price. With the generosity of donations, a good raffle and ticket sales, the concert has so far raised surprisingly £1,238 towards organ repairs. So, thanks again to all concerned. It is pleasing start, and added with the coffee morning in June, there is now a total of £1,538 towards the challenging amount of £17,000 required.

Please watch out for future events in aid of the organ fund and also those in aid of the general costs of running of the Church which still have to be raised annually.



Dog Training Hints and Tips



Over the next few issues, we are going to share some hints and tips to help you and your dogs have a happy and healthy relationship. In this issue, we're starting at the beginning, with hints and tips on Bringing up a Puppy.

For a happy dog and owner, your puppy needs to be a polite, well-behaved, obedient dog. A dog you can be proud of and can take anywhere.

BEGIN ON DAY ONE! Set Rules and Limitations.

- 1) What may appear cute and amusing in a puppy can become destructive and dominant if not checked. For example, finger nibbling may develop into aggressive biting. Give a stern "Uh! Oh!" and redirect unwanted behaviour. For example - hold a chew for puppy to bite on instead of fingers.
- 2) Decide what command words are to be used - 'sit' etc. and keep to these.
- 3) Be firm and consistent.

You should always be the leader.

Your puppy wants to learn from you and follow your instructions. Their aim is to please and do what you wish. It's up to you to guide them in the right direction. For example, on a walk - You go through the door first and puppy walks on a short lead either at your side or just behind.

*** Always praise good behaviour ***







Rudston's Recipes

MARROW CHUTNEY

Ingredients

- 1.5kg/3lb 5oz marrow, peeled and deseeded
- 225g shallot, sliced
- 225g apple, peeled, cored and sliced
- 225g sultana
- 2cm piece ginger, finely chopped
- 225g demerara sugar
- 850ml malt vinegar
- 12 black peppercorns

Method

- Cut the marrow into small pieces, put in a bowl and sprinkle liberally with 2 tbsp salt. Cover and leave for 12 hrs.
- Rinse and drain the marrow, then place in a preserving pan or large saucepan with the shallots, apples, sultanas, ginger, sugar and vinegar. Tie the peppercorns in muslin (or put into a small enclosed tea strainer) and place in the pan. Bring to the boil, then reduce the heat and simmer, stirring from time to time, until the consistency is thick.
- Leave to settle for 10 mins, then spoon into sterilised jars. Put on the lids and label. *Will keep for a year in a cool, dark place.*

APPLE CRISP

Ingredients

For the topping

- 100g plain flour
- 50g rolled oats
- 50g flaked almonds or chopped pecans
- 100g butter, cut into cubes
- 50g light muscovado sugar
- ½ tsp ground cinnamon
- Vanilla ice cream or custard, to serve

For the filling

- 8 Cox's or Russet apples, peeled, cored and sliced into 5mm-thick rounds
- 50g golden caster sugar
- ½ lemon, zested and juiced

Method

- Put all the topping ingredients and a pinch of sea salt in a bowl and rub together with your fingers until combined into a crumb-like texture - this can also be done in a food processor. Chill until needed. *Will keep chilled for up to two days.*
- Toss the apples with the sugar, lemon zest and juice until evenly coated then tip into a 23cm round baking dish that's at least 5cm deep, or a 20cm square dish. Flatten down with your hand and scatter over the topping. *Will keep covered and chilled for a day.*
- Heat the oven to 190°C/170°C fan/Gas mark 5. Sit the crisp on a baking tray and bake for 40 mins until the topping is a deep golden and the fruit is bubbling at the edges. Leave to cool for 10 mins, then serve with ice cream or custard.



2. Three diamonds - Adding together scale A and scale B gives:-

$$1 \spadesuit + 1 \heartsuit + 1 \clubsuit + 2 \diamonds = 7 \spadesuit + 1 \heartsuit, \text{ so } 3 \diamonds + 1 \heartsuit + 1 \clubsuit = 7 \spadesuit + 1 \heartsuit$$

$$\text{Thus } 3 \diamonds = 6 \spadesuit \text{ and } 1 \diamonds = 2 \spadesuit$$

Using this formula, convert \diamonds value in scale A to \spadesuit ,

$$\text{Thus } 2 \spadesuit + 1 \heartsuit = 7 \spadesuit, \text{ so } 1 \heartsuit = 5 \spadesuit$$

$$\text{Thus } 1 \spadesuit + 1 \heartsuit = 1 \spadesuit + 5 \spadesuit = 6 \spadesuit \text{ which equals } 3 \diamonds$$

ANSWERS TO QUIZ plus wider explanation

- 1. Paper money.** During the Hungry Ghost Festival - celebrated during the seventh month of the lunar New Year - fake paper money is burned as an offering to ghosts said to arrive from the underworld. Known as Yue Lan and observed primarily in China, Malaysia, and Singapore, the festival features performances and special food to feed restless spirits.
- 2. Irish potato famine.** Halloween as celebrated in the United States is said to have been spurred in part by the millions of Irish immigrants who arrived in the country during the potato famine years of the mid-19th century. The Irish blend of Celtic ritual and Catholic tradition still resonates in the U.S. today.
- 3. Marigold.** Marigolds, the traditional flowers of the dead, are used throughout El Día de los Muertos, the Day of the Dead. Celebrated in Mexico and other Latin American countries on November 2 - with festivities often beginning on October 31 - the day of remembrance and offering blends Christianity and pre-Columbian ritual.
- 4. Hudson Valley, New York.** Washington Irving's famous spooky tale of Ichabod Crane and the Headless Horseman is set in Hudson Valley in the author's native New York. Today, Hudson Valley - including the namesake town of Sleepy Hollow - celebrates Halloween with haunted walks, bonfires, and even a visit from the mysterious spectre on horseback.
- 5. Disguising herself.** Saint Barbara - whose feast day is celebrated by Arab Christians in Lebanon, Syria, and Palestine - is said to have worn many disguises to elude persecutors after converting to Christianity. On December 3, the eve of Saint Barbara's, children wear costumes and sing for neighbours in return for sweets or small amounts of money.
- 6. Samhain.** On the pre-Christian Celtic calendar, Samhain marked the end of the grazing season and the start of the Celtic New Year with a great feast on November 1. The rites and rituals of the eve of Samhain - a night of dread and danger - inspired the modern tradition.
- 7. Clean ancestral graves.** Many Koreans visit and clean ancestral graves - earth mounds covered in grass - during Chuseok, or Hangawi, a three-day festival that begins with a harvest moon. A major holiday in Korea, Chuseok traditionally brought rural villages together for large feasts, dancing and games.
- 8. True.** For pagan Celts, the world of the dead briefly opened on Samhain eve. At this juncture of the old year and the new, the dead returned, ghosts and demons were abroad, and the future could be seen. Behind such Halloween games as bobbing for apples lie Celtic divination arts to discern who would marry, die or thrive in the coming year.
- 9. Stones** - with the names of family members written on them are traditionally added to bonfires on the first day of winter in Wales, known as Calan Gaeaf. Anyone whose stone is missing in the morning is predicted to die within the year. The eve of Calan Gaeaf is October 31, or Spirit Night, an occasion filled with ghostly superstition.
- 10. A traditional dance** - called eisa is performed on Okinawa during Obon, a three-day holiday for honoring ancestor spirits. During Obon, the dead are believed to reunite with their families, who take part in feasts and prayer. Traditional island celebrations of Obon are determined by the lunar calendar and differ slightly from celebrations on mainland Japan.
