Dog Training Hints and Tips



This will be our final Dog Training Hints and Tips; we hope you've found these articles useful. In this issue, we continue with hints and tips on Leadership & Rules of Authority.

To have the best possible relationship with your dog it is important to be a team - with you very much the team leader. Leadership & authority must be yours. You must make all decisions and give all commands. If you are kind and consistent, firm and fair, your dog will be a happy team member, pleased to follow and obey you.

Here are ways in which you can reinforce your authority to your dog without having to get into a confrontation.

- Make yourself generally more important. When out for a walk, don't let their actions, such as barking, whining, or pawing at your leg, initiate or speed up anything you do in return.
- Never get into situations where your dog dictates how you will react. Many owners, for instance, imagine that when a dog drops a ball at their feet and barks, they have trained him to retrieve; whereas in fact the dog has trained his owner to throw the ball for him on the dog's command. Allowing a dog to dictate like this undermines the owner's authority. Instead train your dog to sit & wait quietly on your command before you throw him the ball.
- Never let your dog have anything he wants such as toys, treats or meals without doing something for you first, such as a ten-second "sit wait" or "down wait" or "watch me".
- Always keep calm and in control. Remember that if you get into a situation that involves shouting or varying levels of hysteria, as far as your dog is concerned you have lost the plot.
- Always be extremely clear about the behaviour you want or don't want at any given time. Instantly reward good behaviour & obedience. Ignore all unwanted behaviour and teach an alternative behaviour, which you do want and can reward.
- Always be seen to be making the most important decisions such as where walks should go and how any visitors & strangers should be greeted, whether human or canine.

Although possibly hard to enforce at first, with time and persistence these rules should become second nature to you - and what a difference you will see in your dog's behaviour as a result.

Gardening Corner by Dick Robinson

Although we are moving towards the end of the year and nights are too dark for outdoor garden work, there are still lots of jobs to try to get done during the few weekend spaces. Soil cultivation on vacant plots was always, the spade ... a good cover of manure then dig well in.

Now is the time to plant tulips and any other spring flowering bulbs, also from now until the end of the year, plant all deciduous trees and shrubs. So, what about starting an orchard of top fruits, that have been propagated onto dwarfing rootstocks? I mentioned apple stocks in the October issue, pears for a small tree on Quince C stock and plum varieties on Pixy stock. There are hundreds of varieties of top fruits. When I worked at RHS Wisley, Surrey, on the National Fruit Trials, there were more than 300 apple and 200 plum and pear varieties on the sandy soil.

For our chalky land I would personally plant dessert apples. For early variety "Discovery" then to follow "Ellison's Orange", then later "Laxton's Superb" and instead of the world famous "Cox" plant the Yorkshire variety "Ribston Pippin".

For culinary use the "Early Victoria" is good for early apple pies. "Lord Derby" is a reliable later keeper. Then we must have the apple "Bramley Seedling". This does well in Yorkshire even though it came from the Isle of Wight. "Howgate Wonder" - what an apple!! For late eating and cooking the dual purpose "Blenheim Orange" is well worth planting.

For pears, plant the famous "Williams" the "Louise Bonne of Jersey" and the queen of all pears "Doyenne du Comice". A new variety that I have never grown is "Concorde", better than the long "Conference". Now onto plums, "Victoria" still reigns top, but "Coe's Golden Drop" is a good gage type for Rudston. New hybrid fruits are now on sale for planting, "Cot'n Candy" is $\frac{3}{4}$ apricot, $\frac{1}{4}$ plum. Another, "Flavour Supreme" is genetically $\frac{3}{4}$ plum, $\frac{1}{4}$ apricot. I have yet to see these, but they sound interesting! Do remember to stake newly planted trees, strong winds do affect the roots until they are well established.

PS. My famous 3 R's - Roses, Raspberries and Rhubarb - all best planted in November.

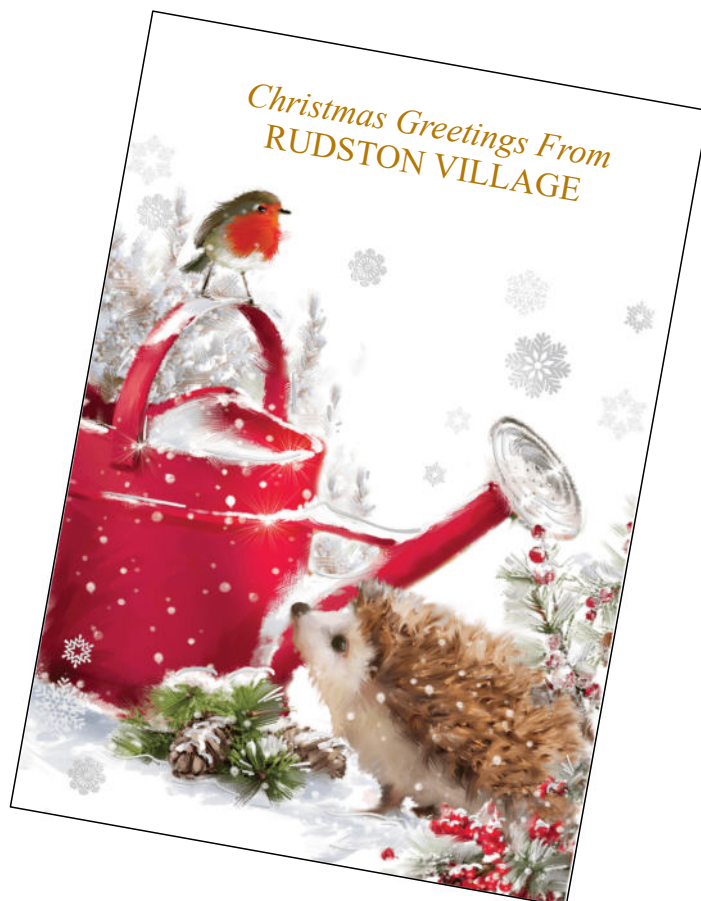

Rudston's Recipes

SMOKEY SAUSAGE & SQUASH TRAYBAKE

Ingredients

- 1 tsp fennel seeds
- 1 tsp smoked paprika
- 1 tsp ground cumin
- 2 tbsp olive oil
- 1 tbsp honey
- 1 tbsp tomato purée
- 1 tbsp harissa
- 8 caramelised onion sausages
- 2 red onions, cut into thick wedges
- 1 large butternut squash, peeled and cut into 2cm thick slices
(see tip, below)
- Small handful of parsley, finely chopped
- Steamed new potatoes and greens, to serve (optional)

Method

- Heat the oven to 200°C/180°C fan/gas mark 6. Combine the fennel, paprika, cumin, oil, honey, tomato purée and harissa in a large bowl.
- Tip in the sausages, onions and squash, and toss gently with your hands to evenly coat everything.
- Tip into a large roasting tin and spread out into an even layer. Roast for 30-40 mins, stirring occasionally to ensure everything is evenly browned.
- Scatter over the parsley and serve with steamed new potatoes and greens, if you like.

Rudston's Recipes (continued)

BRAZILIAN CARROT CAKE

Ingredients

250ml vegetable oil, plus extra for the tin
260g plain flour
400g caster sugar
1 tsp baking powder
2 medium carrots (around 250g), peeled and roughly chopped
2 eggs

For the chocolate drizzle

250ml milk
30g cocoa powder
60g caster sugar

Method

- Heat the oven to 180°C/160°C fan/Gas mark 4. Oil and line the base of a 20cm springform cake tin. Mix the flour, sugar and baking powder together in a large bowl and set aside. Tip the oil, carrots and eggs in a blender and blitz until smooth. Pour the wet ingredients into the dry, stirring until smooth.
- Pour the batter into the cake tin and give it a shake to get rid of any air bubbles. Bake for 45 minutes to 1 hour, until a clean knife or skewer inserted into the middle comes out clean. If the middle is sticky, put back in the oven for a further 5 mins. Remove from the oven and leave to cool in the tin.
- For the drizzle, heat the milk, cocoa and sugar in a saucepan over a low heat. Stir until the sugar dissolves (about 5 mins), creating a thick, shiny drizzle.
- Remove the cake from the tin and level the top using a serrated knife, then flip so the bottom becomes the top. Pierce all over using a knife or toothpick and put on a wire rack with a tray or large bowl underneath. Pour the drizzle over the cake in batches until it's all absorbed. You can reuse any drizzle caught in the tray or bowl. Most of the drizzle should be absorbed.

Explanation of how to solve puzzle number 1

Gorka's partner was Dianne (clue A). Jowita's partner was not Vito (clue B) and, since her preferred dance, the Wiltshire Tempest, followed the one enjoyed by Vito (clue B), her partner cannot have been Johannes, who preferred the first dance of the five (clue E). Nor can he have been Aljaž, whose partner had a longer name than the woman who enjoyed the American Square Dance (clue C) which must have been Karen since her name only contains 5 letters, plus Aljaž's partners' name starts later on in the alphabet. Therefore Jowita's partner must have been Nikita.

The Circassian Circle was the fifth dance (clue A). Since Johannes preferred the first dance (clue E), the Wiltshire Tempest, favoured by Nikita and Jowita, cannot have been the second of the five (clue B), nor was it the third (clue D), so it must have been the fourth. So, from clue B, Vito and his partner must have preferred the third dance. Gorka and Dianne did not prefer the fifth dance, the Circassian Circle (clue A), so they must have selected the second dance as their favourite, leaving the Circassian Circle as the choice of Aljaž and his partner. The latter cannot have been Lauren (clue F) so Aljaž's partner must have been Nadiya.

As the fourth dance was the Wiltshire Tempest, from clue F, Lauren, whose preference was for the dance immediately before the Texas Schottische cannot have shared Vito's preference for the third dance, so she must have been Johannes' partner and the Texas Schottische must have been the second dance, Gorka and Dianne's favourite.

By elimination, Karen must have been Vito's partner, so her favourite, the American Square Dance, must have been the third of the five, leaving Drops of Brandy as the first dance, enjoyed by Johannes and Lauren.

The 8ft tall Gunpowder Plot Sculpture can be found on the edge of a field just off the B1445 road near Welwick. Two of the plotters, brothers Jack and Kit Wright, were born in the village and now their likeness stands alongside fellow gunpowder enthusiasts Guy Fawkes (the famous one) and Robert Catesby (ringleader of the gang).
