## CHURCH NEWS (CONTINUED)

Dear Friends

March brings with it the season of Lent (the run up and preparation for Easter) which starts with Ash Wednesday on 5th March. On that day many Christians receive the sign of a cross in ash on their forehead; ashes being a sign of penitence, rooted in the Old Testament (you get some strange looks in the supermarket later if you forget to wash it off).

Lent has a rich church history; for example, in the sixth century Christians who had committed grave faults were obliged to do public penance. On Ash Wednesday, they donned a hair shirt (which they wore for 40 days), and the local bishop blessed them and sprinkled them with ashes. Then, while others recited the Seven Penitential Psalms, the penitents were turned out of the holy place. They could not enter the church again until Maundy Thursday (the Thursday before Easter), when they received absolution.

Thankfully the church takes Lent a bit gentler now, but we can still use the time to think about our faith and try to do something practical to help 'get-fit' spiritually (giving up chocolate seems to be a favourite penance these days!).

Locally we have a few things that may help you on your Lent journey: All the usual groups/activities above will all have a Lent theme. Also, we are making the most of the digital platforms (thankfully we have a growing number of folk who are digitally savvy). Each Monday in Lent we'll have a short evening prayer (20 mins or so) using Facebook 'live' - we'll be using the All Saints Church, Kilham, Facebook page. We'll also have a weekly 'Zoom' get-together with a biblical/Lenten theme, please get in touch for more details.

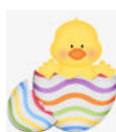

## Life-Saving Defibrillators in Rudston - Get Involved!

Rudston is lucky to have **two** community defibrillators, ready to help in an emergency. You'll find them at:

- 📍 **Middle Street** - inside the old phone box
- 📍 **East Gate** - opposite Hill View

These vital devices were funded by **Rudston Parish Council** and are regularly checked by dedicated volunteer guardians. They're also registered with **The Circuit**, ensuring their status is always up to date with the Ambulance Service.

### Need to use a defibrillator?

📞 **Call 999** – Ensure you're within **1,600 metres** of a unit so the Ambulance Service can provide you with the access code.

### Volunteer Opportunity – Can You Help?

We're looking for a **new guardian** for the Middle Street defibrillator! This simple but essential role involves the following at monthly intervals:

- Checking the battery charge
- Ensuring the pads are in place and in date
- Logging checks online (only takes a few minutes)

All you need is **internet access and an email address**. If you notice any issues or need supplies, just let the Parish Council Clerk know. Training will be provided.

## **THE FOUR SEASONS FRUIT & VEG**

**Charlie is still  
happy to deliver all  
your fresh fruit and

During World War II, even small villages like Rudston felt the impact of enemy attacks. On one fateful night, several bombs fell on the village, damaging homes, the church and the school.

These personal recollections from Margaret Woodcock and Dick Robinson bring to life the events of that night - the destruction, the resilience of the community and the efforts to rebuild.

### **The Bomb That Fell on Rudston**

I remember the night of the bombing well. I was living at Glebe Farm in Rudston at the time. One bomb fell in a field across the road from the church, on land belonging to Mr M Thompson. The blast damaged the east-side windows of the church and the farmhouse where Mr and Mrs Thompson lived, forcing them to relocate to Bridlington.

The School House, home to the headmaster Mr. North and his wife, was also badly damaged, and they too had to move to Bridlington. The damage to the school led to a two-week closure, after which lessons resumed in the old Wesleyan chapel, now the Village Hall.

The church organ sustained significant damage, leaving me to play the piano for morning services - an unexpected promotion from the choir! I still remember Mrs Allison playing the piano at my wedding in Rudston Church five years later, as the organ had not yet been repaired.

That night left a terrible scene of fires across the village. In the aftermath, a ladies' committee was formed to raise funds to replace the church windows and repair the damage. Lady Rachel MacDonald chaired the committee, and I served as secretary. Together, we raised £2,000 - a significant sum for the time. I believe I may be the last surviving member of that committee.

## Bombs on Rudston

Several high-explosive and incendiary bombs fell on Rudston during the war. Thankfully, there was only one casualty - a pig in its sty in the garden at Waterhome Cottage, home to Frank and Kathleen Algar.

The bombs caused damage to the church, a farmhouse, and several other properties. At the time, I was working in Hull for the Parks Department, having recently returned from Rudston.

Frank telephoned my family to share the news, speculating that the plane responsible might have been returning from a raid on Hull that night and had dropped its remaining load on Rudston on its way back to base.

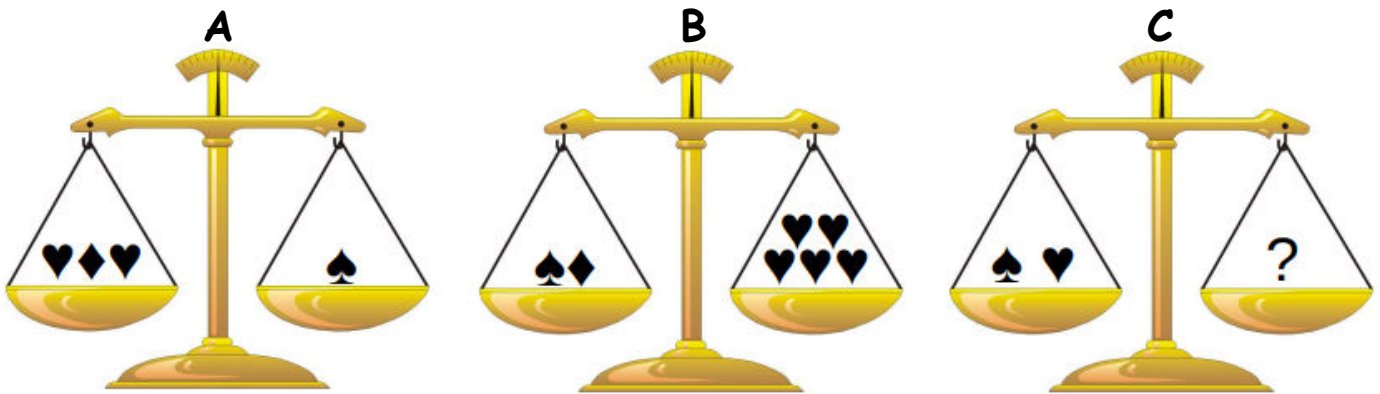

## Rudston's Recipes

### BEEF NOODLE CASSEROLE

#### Ingredients

- Salt
- 12oz egg noodles
- 2 tbsp unsalted butter
- 2 tbsp extra-virgin olive oil
- 1lb (85% lean) ground beef
- 1 large yellow onion, finely chopped
- 3 cloves garlic, finely chopped
- 1 x (15oz) can tomato sauce
- 1 x (10½oz) can cream of mushroom soup
- ⅓ carton of double cream
- 8oz sharp cheddar, shredded, divided
- 1 tbsp chopped fresh parsley

#### Method

- Preheat oven to 175°C/350°F/Gas mark 4.
- In a large pot of boiling salted water, cook noodles, stirring occasionally, until 1 minute less than al dente according to package directions.
- Drain; reserve 1 cup pasta water. Add butter to noodles and toss to combine.
- Meanwhile, in another large pot over medium-high heat, heat oil. Cook beef, breaking up with a wooden spoon, until no longer pink, about 6 minutes; season with salt.
- Reduce heat to medium. Add onion and garlic and cook, stirring, until onion is translucent, 4 to 5 minutes. Add tomato sauce, soup, cream and one-third of cheese. Bring to a simmer and cook, adding ½ to 1 cup pasta water, until cheese is melted and desired consistency is reached, about 1 minute; season with salt, if needed. Add noodles to pot and mix with meat mixture.
- Pour into 13" x 9" baking pan and sprinkle with remaining cheese.
- Bake casserole until centre and edges are bubbly, 30 minutes. Top with parsley.



## Rudston's Recipes (continued)

### RHUBARB, MARZIPAN AND CITRUS CAKE

#### Ingredients

300g softened butter, plus a little for the tin  
400g thin-stemmed rhubarb, cut into thick pieces  
350g golden caster sugar  
½ orange, zested  
½ lemon, zested  
3 large eggs  
200g self-raising flour  
50g fine polenta  
50g ground almonds  
1 tsp baking powder  
100g marzipan chopped into small chunks

#### Method

- Heat oven to 180°C/160°C fan/gas mark 4. Butter and line a 20 x 30cm traybake tin with baking parchment. Toss the rhubarb in 50g sugar and set aside to macerate for 20 mins.
- Tip the butter, remaining sugar and zests into a large bowl. Beat with an electric whisk until light and fluffy. Add the eggs, one at a time, mixing well between each addition. Add the flour, polenta, almonds, baking powder and a good pinch of salt, and mix until just combined. Fold through half the rhubarb (reserving the rest for the top), plus any juices and the marzipan.
- Scrape the mixture into the tin. Smooth the surface up to the edges and top with the remaining rhubarb. Bake for 45-50 mins until risen and golden, and a skewer inserted in the centre of the cake comes out clean. If there is any wet mixture, return it to the oven for 5 mins, then check again.
- Cool in the tin for 10 mins, then serve warm with crème fraiche, or cool completely to serve as a cake.

*Will keep in an airtight container for three days*

## **Gardening Corner by Dick Robinson** - First published in March 2015

I've watched so many cooking programmes on TV during the Christmas period, and since, that I now feel qualified to start a new career. I must admit that I do like to see James Martin and his friends in the kitchen. Perhaps I'd better stick to the garden, although I do make a reasonable Yorkshire Pudding, but need help with that essential onion gravy.

This all reminds me that I must plant my shallots, a veg loved by cooks. There was a time when most folks grew a row of shallots. I remember, as an apprentice, it was the custom to plant these on the shortest day and lift them on the longest. Onion sets are popular and there is a number of varieties to choose from.

Now on to potatoes, I must plant my Arram Pilots, like all varieties the best crops come from clean, virus free tubers and a well worked soil, with plenty of farmyard manure added. March is the main sowing and planting month so one can't go far wrong by getting cracking, splitting up clumps of chives and so-called Welsh onions, all useful in the kitchen.

Watch out for aphids on fruit bushes, especially on blackcurrants. It's too early to sow French and runner beans, and tender marrow and pumpkins. I sow a few in 3" pots at the end of March or even early April, ready for planting out when the risk of frost has passed.

Get ready next month the help fruit trees in particular apple trees set their blossom, more about this in next month's edition. Anyway, keep on gardening, no need for the gym. Let's hope for a good season.

$$1 \spadesuit + 2 \heartsuit + 1 \spadesuit = 5 \heartsuit,$$

$$\text{thus } 2 \spadesuit + 2 \heartsuit = 5 \heartsuit,$$
