Thank you again for your support.



REMEMBERING RUDSTON DURING WWII

We continue to delve into Rudston's past, uncovering stories of resilience, community spirit and heroism. From local tales of wartime preparations to memories of how the village pulled together, these narratives serve as a poignant reminder of our shared history.

We hope these stories not only commemorate the past but also inspire future generations to reflect on the courage and unity shown during those pivotal days.

Fred Leary "Old Soldier" (1920-2016) - An Old Soldier Remembers.....

Fred Leary is an old soldier who served in the Northamptonshire Yeomanry in the second World War. In his email he writes that he is in his 95th year and has been reflecting on Christmas 1943, when his regiment was stationed in our friendly village of Rudston.

Fred visited the village 2 years ago, when his nephew brought him here for a nostalgic visit and he wrote to Rosie, the previous editor, to say it was good to see the village and that it had grown out of all recognition.

Fred continues with his story... "It was almost 70 years now that we made the best of life away from our families, before that horrible experience in Normandy. Your village was quite small at the time. At the crossroads leading from Kilham, we had our guard room. I don't remember whether it was a tent or a Nissan hut. In a small field opposite we had our troop of scout cars and also our dispatch riders with their motorbikes. On the same corner was the village shop, owned by Mr and Mrs. Stephenson, who had 3 daughters. I became friendly with the family and still keep in touch by letter, with the eldest daughter Dorothy Milson (nee Stephenson). There were not many houses on the road leading to the shop, perhaps a few on the left side.

On the right was a marquee, which was used as a mess tent and next to our Nissen hut, where we lived. A bit further on, we had a truck park, where the "powers that be" built a concrete block to the exact measurements of a ramp of an LST (landing ship tank). It was built for us to know how to reverse our trucks on to the landing craft. It was used by many other regiments too. So you could say that your village played a very vital part in the invasion.

One night in May 1944, it was my turn to drive the 3-ton truck full of soldiers, for a night at the cinema. During the film, it came on the screen "All men of the Northants to return to camp immediately" so we never did find out if "Pip received his Great Expectations"; I can't really remember the film. Back in camp, we packed our few belongings and the next day we moved to Aldershot, to prepare for the invasion and the unknown. No time to say goodbye.

During my last visit, I only found two people who remember the Yeomanry. I met Mr and Mrs. Burgess; another lady whom I did not meet was Margaret (nee Stephenson). Just a few memories of your delightful village. This year we won't be rolling a barrel of beer down the street, as we did in that far off time in 1943".

RAF 158 Squadron

I have had correspondence from our old soldier, Fred Leary, who was stationed in Rudston during the war. He was responding to the article about the Lissett wind farm and wrote the following: "I just wondered if the people of Rudston would know that during the war, Lissett was the home of 158 Squadron RAF.

It was on that very field where my brother Sergeant Harry Leary was stationed. Harry was a gunner in a Halifax bomber and he was involved in many raids over Europe. Harry was finally shot down over Holland in 1943 and was a POW for two years. Harry left us 15 years ago but I am sure that he would be happy to know that the old airfield is now put to good use."

Who Rescued the Baby?

I recently spoke with Walt Burgess, who vividly remembers the night a bomb fell on Rudston during World War II. The bomb landed right in the middle of the road, outside the village reading room. Walt recalls that several fires were caused by incendiary bombs, lighting up the village so brightly that, as he put it, "you could read a newspaper in the light caused by the fires," despite the blackout.

Walt was a member of the village fire service, where his father served as chief. On that chaotic night, it was Walt's job to contact the main fire service. As he hurried to complete this task, his father accidentally fell into a bomb crater.

Geoff Chatterton first told me about this tragic night, which occurred in September 1943. At the time, Geoff was just an 18-month-old baby, asleep in his cot at his grandparents' house in the end cottage. Though the house sustained significant damage, someone rescued baby Geoffrey from his cot. To this day, neither Geoff nor Walt knows who performed this heroic act, but as Walt remarked, "Geoff was lucky to be alive".



Rudston's Recipes

ONE-POT BRAISED LAMB BREAST WITH BEANS, CARROTS & MINT

Ingredients

2 boneless lamb breasts (about 1.4kg in total) 6 garlic cloves, finely chopped small bunch of rosemary, needles picked and chopped, stalks reserved 1 lemon, zested 1 tbsp sunflower oil 3 carrots, cut into small chunks 1 onion, finely chopped 1 glass of white wine (or use a total of 400ml stock) 300ml lamb or chicken stock 2 x 400g cans flageolet beans, drained but not rinsed

For the mint sauce

Large bunch of mint, leaves picked & finely chopped Small bunch of parsley, leaves picked & finely chopped 3 tbsp capers, drained & finely chopped 2 anchovy fillets, finely chopped (optional) 1 tbsp Dijon mustard 2 tbsp red wine vinegar 100ml olive oil

Method

- Put the lamb on a chopping board, flesh-side up and season all over generously. Scatter over the garlic, chopped rosemary and lemon zest, then roll up tightly lengthways and secure with kitchen string.
- Heat the oven to 170°C/150°C fan/gas 3. Heat the oil in a large flameproof casserole over a medium-high heat and brown the lamb until deeply golden all over, about 10-15 mins. Lift onto a plate, then tip the carrots, onions and rosemary stalks into the pan and cook for 10 mins until just starting to colour. Pour in the wine, if using, and stock, and bring to a simmer. Nestle the lamb into the veg mixture, then cover and transfer to the oven for 3 hrs, turning the lamb once or twice until tender.
- Meanwhile, make the mint sauce by combining the herbs, capers and anchovies, then whisking in the mustard, vinegar and olive oil. Season and set aside. Can be made up to a day ahead and chilled. Or, blitz all the ingredients together in a food processor or mini-chopper.
- When the lamb is tender, lift it onto a board to rest. Strain the veg over a heatproof jug, reserving the roasting juices. Return the vegetables to the casserole. Spoon off as much fat as you can from the reserved roasting juices, then pour this over the veg along with the beans. Set the casserole over a low heat for 15-20 mins to warm the beans. When the beans are hot and the lamb has rested, carve the lamb into thick slices and serve with the beans, with the mint sauce on the side.

EASTER BROWNIES

Ingredients

185g unsalted butter, cut into small chunks, plus extra for greasing
185g best dark chocolate, broken into pieces
3 large eggs
275g golden caster sugar
85g plain flour
40g cocoa powder
5 fondant filled eggs
150g mini chocolate eggs

To decorate

You will also need a few fluffy chenille Easter chicks to decorate (optional)

Method

- Put the butter and the chocolate in a medium-sized heatproof bowl and set over a pan of simmering water, stirring occasionally until melted. Alternatively, cover the bowl loosely with cling film and microwave at 30 sec intervals until melted. Leave the melted chocolate mixture to cool to room temperature.
- Heat oven to 180°C/160°C fan/gas 4. Grease a 20cm square tin with butter and line with 2 long strips of folded baking paper or foil one running top to bottom, the other left to right then line the base with a piece of baking paper. The strips will help you lift it out later.
- Break the eggs into a large bowl and tip in the caster sugar. With an electric mixer on maximum speed, whisk the eggs and sugar for around 5-8 mins or until they look thick and creamy and have doubled in size.
- Pour the cooled chocolate mixture over the egg mixture, then gently fold together.
- Sieve the flour and cocoa into the wet ingredients then continue to fold the mixture gently with a spatula just until everything is fully combined, try not to over-mix.
- Pour the mixture into the prepared tin and carefully level the mixture with the spatula. Put in the middle of the oven and bake for 20 minutes.
- Meanwhile, cut the fondant filled eggs in half and set aside then place the mini chocolate eggs into a pestle and mortar. Crush a few of the mini chocolate eggs but leave some whole. After 20 mins take the brownie out of the oven and press in the fondant eggs, cut side up. Scatter over half of the mini chocolate eggs too then put it back in the oven for a further 5 mins.
- Once baked, top with the remaining mini eggs, leave to cool completely then place in the fridge for about 1hr to firm up. Lift it out of the tin using the strips of baking paper and cut into squares to serve. Decorate with little Easter chicks if you like.

Gardening Corner by Dick Robinson - First published in April 2015

We have just stewed the last of our "keeping" apples, I love stewed apple at tea time. The crop of Bramleys, last year, was a big one but the fruit was small, lack of water at the important time of growth.

This is the month when a lot of apple varieties come into full blossom, others wait till May. Most varieties need another sort to allow fertilisation and a good set of embryo fruits, so where there are a few different varieties being grown in a village or parish there is usually no problems. There are however a few that need two other varieties nearby. Bramley Seedling, the well-known cooker is one of these. One way to help these is to cut a few shoots from a crab apple, when in flower, place them in water and put them under the apple trees in your garden. This allows the bees and other insects to transfer the pollen from one to the other. In commercial orchards mixed planting can overcome pollination problems.

There is still time to do any grafting of top fruits, and feed soft fruit bushes if not already done so. A general fertiliser helps to make new shoots for the next fruiting season. Any plants offered for sale should be well hardened off before planting out, especially any of the popular floral bedding varieties.

I'm sowing runner beans into small pots, then hope to plant out at the end of May when all chance of frost has passed. Leeks are one of the best winter vegetables, also excellent for making soup, so now is the time to sow some in pots, and a few outside directly into the soil. The best blanch leeks are "Oarsman" and "Neptunes" and for late ones the well-known favourite "Mussleburgh". Leeks like a well manured soil.

Finally sow winter cabbage at the end of this month. Keep sowing a few lettuces and the pea family, carrots and white turnips. A farmer friend tells me it's too early to sow my favourite winter veg' the swede turnip!!
