### **Hello Everyone**

As we approach the 8oth anniversary of VE Day, we continue to uncover powerful Rudston's stories from wartime past - tales of resilience, courage and the enduring spirit of our village. Passed down through generations, these memories remind us of the challenges faced and the sacrifices made by those who lived through such turbulent times.

This month, we share two poignant glimpses into how global conflict touched local lives. The first is a personal reflection from the Drewery recalling their family, relatives' experience as evacuees in Rudston during World War II - an account that highlights the village as a place of safety and community in a time of great uncertainty. The second story recounts the tragic train crash at Burton Agnes in 1947, involving German prisoners of war and British soldiers. It stands as a

solemn reminder of the human cost of war, even after peace had officially returned.

By preserving and sharing these stories, we keep history alive - not only to honour the past, but to inspire future generations with the values of unity, compassion and remembrance.

To mark this historic occasion, a lamp lighting ceremony will take place at the Bosville Arms on Thursday 8th May at 9.30pm.

Then, on **Saturday 10th May**, all are warmly invited to the **Village Hall** for an afternoon of **VE Day celebrations** - a chance for the community to come together, reflect and remember.

#### A word from Ian Fletcher (Licenced Lay Minister/Reader) at All Saints, Rudston

For many people the three important days that they recognise in the Christian calendar are Christmas Day, Easter Day and Pentecost Sunday. Of these three only Christmas Day has a fixed date but Easter and Pentecost are linked together in that Pentecost, known to some as Whit Sunday and previous to that as White Sunday, always follows 50 days after Easter.

The result of a late Easter, as this year, is that Pentecost Sunday falls into June leaving us with Ascension Day as the major traditional event in May. Ascension Day tends, in this country, to be a date properly observed by the more enthusiastic Christians but in other countries it is a very important date in both the Christian, and the local calendar. Ascension Day falls 40 days after Easter which means it is always properly observed on a Thursday, rather than on a Sunday, and this year it is observed on May 29th.

#### **COMMEMORATING VE-DAY: RUDSTON'S WARTIME STORIES**

This May, as we mark the anniversary of VE-Day, we pause to remember the bravery and sacrifice of those who served during World War II. Here in Rudston, the echoes of history are closer than we might think. Our village witnessed events and shared experiences that shaped the lives of those who lived through those challenging times.

This month, we share two poignant glimpses into the impact of war on our region. The first is a personal reflection from the Drewery family, recalling their relatives' time as evacuees in Rudston during World War II - a story that highlights the village's role as a place of refuge in uncertain times. The second recounts the tragic Burton Agnes train crash of 1947, involving German prisoners of war and British soldiers, a sobering reminder of the lingering consequences of conflict even after the fighting had ended. Both stories offer a moving perspective on how global events touched local lives.

We hope these stories not only commemorate the past but also inspire future generations to reflect on the courage and unity shown during those pivotal days.

#### **EVACUEES**

During World War II, many children were evacuated from Hull to rural villages like Rudston for safety. My aunt, Margaret Drewery, and her mother were among those evacuated, finding refuge in Rudston. My aunt's mother initially taught at the local school and, as we understand, lived with the schoolmaster. Later, they moved into one of the newly built cottages on South Side Lane, known as Nightingale Row. At the end of the war, they returned to Hull.

Imagine our surprise when, years later, we moved to Rudston and discovered that our relatives had once lived in the very same village!

#### **Burton Agnes Train Crash**

On 17 September 1947, a tragic accident occurred at the Burton Agnes level crossing near Bridlington, East Yorkshire. An army lorry transporting German prisoners of war (POWs) collided with a passenger train travelling from Hull to Bridlington. The collision resulted in the immediate deaths of two British non-commissioned officers and seven German POWs, with three additional POWs succumbing to their injuries later in the hospital.


The incident transpired when the lorry, driven by an unauthorized and reportedly inexperienced driver, Staff Sergeant James Joseph Wadey, crashed through the level crossing gates into the path of the oncoming train, which was travelling at approximately 60 mph and was not scheduled to stop at Burton Agnes. The impact was devastating, leading to significant casualties among the occupants of the lorry.

In the aftermath, a memorial plaque was installed to honour those who lost their lives in this tragedy. The plaque commemorates Staff Sergeant Wadey, Sergeant Ronald Montague Cramer and the ten German POWs who perished in the collision. It also acknowledges all Axis Power POWs who contributed to agricultural work in the area during that period.

For those interested in a more comprehensive account of this incident, Richard M Jones authored a book titled "The Burton Agnes Disaster: The Forgotten Wartime Rail Tragedy", which delves into the details and aftermath of the collision. This tragic event serves as a sombre reminder of the perils associated with railway crossings and the human cost of errors during such operations.

### **Rudston's Recipes**

#### **SAMPHIRE AND CRAB SALAD**

#### **Ingredients**

2 slices of sourdough bread

1½ tbsp rapeseed oil

180g samphire

1 lemon, juiced

1 tbsp crème fraiche

1 crab, brown and white meat separated

(about 60g of each)

1 tbsp chopped dill (optional)

100g watercress

#### Method

- Heat the oven to 220°C/200°C fan/gas mark 7. Tear the bread into rough chunks and put in a bowl with ½ tbsp rapeseed oil and a little seasoning. Toss well, then tip onto a baking tray. Bake for 8-10 mins until golden. Set aside.
- Bring a large pan of water to the boil and cook the samphire for 3 mins before draining and plunging into ice-cold water. Leave to cool for a few minutes before draining.
- To make the dressing, combine the lemon juice, crème fraiche, remaining 1 tbsp rapeseed oil, the brown crabmeat and dill, if using, in a small bowl.
   Season, mix to evenly combine and set aside.
- Mix the watercress and drained samphire together in a large bowl, drizzle over the dressing and toss well to coat. Serve on a platter or divide between plates, then top with the white crabmeat and croutons.

#### **Rudston's Recipes (continued)**

#### **ETON MESS SCONES**

#### **Ingredients**

400g self-raising flour, plus extra for dusting

¼ tsp salt

1 tsp baking powder

100g butter, cut into cubes

3 tbsp caster sugar, plus extra for sprinkling

200ml buttermilk

1 tsp vanilla extract

5 tbsp milk, plus extra for brushing good handful small strawberries, halved small jar good strawberry jam
2 meringue nests, crumbled into chunks
200ml tub clotted cream

#### Method

- Heat oven to 220°C/200°C fan/gas mark 7. Mix the flour, salt and baking powder together in a large bowl. Rub in the butter or whizz the lot in a food processor to fine crumbs, then stir in the sugar.
- Warm the buttermilk, vanilla and milk to hand temperature, then quickly stir it into the flour mixture with a knife. Using your hands, bring the dough together, being careful not to overwork the mix.
- Turn dough out onto a lightly floured work surface and pat out to a 2.5cm thick round. Stamp out 12 x 5cm rounds, dusting the cutter with flour as you stamp you'll need to re-pat trimmings to make 12. Put the rounds onto floured baking sheets, brush the tops with milk and sprinkle with a little more sugar. Bake for 12-15 mins until golden.
- To serve, lightly mash the strawberries with the jam and fold the meringues into the clotted cream. Dollop some strawberry mixture onto each split scone and top with a dollop of meringue cream.

#### Gardening Corner by Dick Robinson - First published in May 2015

This will be our last visit to Dick Robinson's gardening corner. We hope his words and advice have proved useful and perhaps some of you have enjoyed a trip down memory lane.

The word "Strawberries" reminds me of Wimbledon, and sunshine. The big advantage of strawberries is that they need small spaces to grow, they give quick returns compared with other soft fruits. If given a good soil and a healthy variety, crops can be gathered within 9 months of planting.

Runners, put in early in September, should give excellent crops the following summer, if planted after mid-October the crop is likely to be small. Commercial fruit growers have made great changes over the last 10 years, now many home gardeners have followed. It is now possible to have fresh strawberries from late this month to the end of September or even early October. All this is due to the use of the so called "Everbearing" varieties and the use of cold stored runners. Growing on raised beds under glass or in pots or growbags or under plastic structures all helps. Suitable varieties are GARIGUETTE for late May cropping, SONATA to follow for later and FINESSE for September.

It was always policy in the old estate gardens to put up runners in the late autumn, feed well and grow them on benches in the vineries to crop early the next spring, the flowers being hand pollenated to ensure a crop.

This is the time to get at small weed seedlings, chickweed, groundsel and those stinging nettles that seem to appear every year. The Dutch Hoe (Skim to the Easy Riding gardener) is the tool. Keep it going throughout the summer.

Summer flowering bulbs and tubers can be planted now along with any potatoes still sprouting. Seed of dwarf and runner beans can go in now, but wait till the end of May before planting out any pot grown plants off the bean family.

For next year's biennial flowers sow now outside, wallflowers, polyanthus, hollyhocks etc. also any salads to keep up supply. Finally, you can sow my favourite of all winter vegetables the hardy Swede Turnip.


