
VACANCY FOR A COUNCILLOR

Supporting Wildlife this Summer

Summer is a vital time for supporting wildlife in your garden. Many birds, bees, butterflies and other creatures are feeding young or building up energy reserves. Here are some wildlife-friendly gardening tips to make your summer garden a haven for nature:

Bees, Butterflies & Other Pollinators



- Plant nectar-rich flowers: Go for varieties like lavender, verbena bonariensis, echinacea, buddleia, sedum and single-flowered dahlias.
- Stagger your blooms: Choose plants that flower at different times so there's a steady supply of nectar all summer.
- Let herbs flower: Herbs like thyme, oregano, chives and mint are pollinator magnets when in bloom.
- Avoid pesticides: Chemicals can harm beneficial insects. Try natural alternatives or accept a little damage as part of a healthy ecosystem.



Birds

- Provide water: Keep a bird bath topped up with clean water for drinking and bathing - especially during hot spells.
- Feed wisely: Keep bird feeders clean and well-stocked with a mix of seeds, suet and mealworms.
- Let things go to seed: Don't deadhead everything - plants like sunflowers and teasels provide great natural food sources.
- Leave nesting areas undisturbed: Avoid pruning dense shrubs or hedges that may be home to nesting birds.



Hedgehogs, Frogs & Beneficial Creatures



- Leave a wild corner: A patch of long grass, brambles, or nettles offers shelter and food.
- Create log piles: Deadwood is brilliant for beetles, fungi and hedgehog hiding spots.
- Install a small pond: Even a tiny pond in a container can support frogs, newts and thirsty insects.
- Make a hedgehog highway: If you have fences, create small gaps at ground level so hedgehogs can move freely between gardens.

General Tips

- Ditch the strimmer in wild areas: Long grass and nettle patches can be home to caterpillars, insects and froglets.
- Compost garden waste: A compost heap not only recycles nutrients but offers a home for slow worms and toads.
- Night-friendly plants: Evening-scented blooms like honeysuckle and jasmine attract moths, which in turn feed bats.



I was pleased to find this lovely photo of an April 1913 Rudston wedding. It seemed to be a breezy day – look at the bridesmaids' dresses and the choirboys' surplices, and by the church door there are at least two ladies with scarves tied over their hats.



The photo did not have names on, but I thought it would be reported in the local press and sure enough it was:

“FASHIONABLE DISTRICT WEDDING” ~ Mr W L G Bennett and Miss Ida C Booty

The marriage took place yesterday at 2.30pm at All Saints Church, Rudston of Mr W L Galton Bennett only son of the Rev F and Mrs Bennett of Paignton, Devon and Miss Ida Cassandra Booty, second daughter of the Rev C S and Mrs Booty of Rudston. The officiating clergy were the Rt Rev Bishop Richardson, the Rev A H Boyd-Carpenter and the Rev F Bennett. The service was fully choral.

The bride, who was given away by her father, wore a gown of ivory satin charmeuse, draped with needle-run lace, the work of her mother and carried a shower bouquet... Her veil of tulle was held in place by a wreath of orange blossom.

There were four bridesmaids, Miss Macdonald of the Isles, Miss Una Lane, cousin of the bride of Chichester, Miss V Storey cousin of the bride, and Miss Margaret Mitford of Hunmanby Vicarage.

After the ceremony a reception was held at Rudston Vicarage (*note - this is the old vicarage on Eastgate*) by the Rev C S and Mrs Booty”.

The newspaper article listed many wedding presents, including a breakfast service from Mr and Mrs David Holtby, and milk jugs and butter dishes from the Misses Holtby who would be Grace and Winifred. There was a list of guests at the wedding numbering about 110.

Sir Alexander was the organist. The bride, accompanied by her father was driven to church in Sir Alexander's new car, the bride being a god child of Sir Alexander's mother from whom she took the name Cassandra.

This is a summary of a quite detailed report in the local newspaper. If anyone would like to see the full article, I am very happy to send it to them.

Rudston's Recipes

CRISPY BBQ SALMON

Ingredients

- a few sprigs of thyme or rosemary
- 500g new potatoes
- olive oil
- ½ a bunch of tarragon, (10g)
- ½ a bunch of basil, (15g)
- 1 lemon
- 1 x 600g salmon fillet, skin on, scaled, pin-boned, from sustainable sources
- 360g asparagus
- 400g ripe cherry tomatoes, on the vine
- extra virgin olive oil

Method

- Soak 2 large handfuls of applewood chips in water for 30 minutes, then drain and transfer to the smoker box with a few sprigs of thyme or rosemary (or you can use cinnamon, if you like), and place in the centre of the barbecue.
- Ignite all of the burners to medium-high and leave with the lid closed until the temperature gauge is at roughly 260°C and the applewood chips are smoking.
- Turn the right-hand burner to very low, and the left and central burners to medium.
- Toss the potatoes with a little olive oil and sea salt, then tip onto a deluxe grilling pan and place on the right-hand side of the barbecue (very low heat).
- Close the lid and cook for 30 minutes, or until golden and just tender, jiggling the pan occasionally for even cooking.
- Meanwhile, pick and roughly chop the tarragon and most of the basil, and finely grate the lemon zest, then toss in a small bowl with a little salt and freshly ground black pepper.
- With the tip of a sharp knife, cut long slits into the length of the salmon, taking them roughly halfway down into the flesh, and leaving a 2cm gap between each one.
- Stuff each cut with the herby mixture, then drizzle the salmon lightly with oil and season to perfection.
- Turn the left-hand burner up to medium-high, then place the salmon, skin-side down, directly on the bars. Close the lid and cook for 10 minutes.
- When the time's up, using a spatula and moving in the same direction as the grill bars, carefully flip the salmon and cook for a further 6-8 minutes, or until the salmon is just cooked through. Carefully peel off the skin and place crispy side up on the top cooking grate.
- Meanwhile, snap the woody ends off the asparagus and place in a bowl with the tomatoes. Toss with a drizzle of olive oil and a pinch of salt.
- When the 30 minutes is up and they're golden and tender, move the potatoes to the top cooking grate, then place the asparagus and tomatoes onto the deluxe grilling pan. Cook alongside the salmon until the asparagus is tender and lightly charred, and the tomato skins are splitting, jiggling the veg tray a couple of times for even cooking.
- Transfer the tomatoes and asparagus to a serving platter, add a good squeeze of lemon juice and drizzle with 2 tablespoons of extra virgin olive oil. Place the salmon on top and crack over the crispy skin. Place the potatoes into a serving bowl, then get stuck in!!!

Rudston's Recipes (continued)

CLASSIC POTATO SALAD

Ingredients

800g small new potato
3 shallots, finely chopped
1 tbsp small capers (optional)
2 tbsp cornichons, finely chopped (optional)
3 tbsp mayonnaise, or to taste
3 tbsp extra-virgin olive oil
1 tbsp white wine vinegar
small handful parsley leaves, roughly chopped

Method

- Boil the potatoes in salted water for 20 mins until just cooked, drain, then cool.
- Cut the potatoes into chunks, then throw into a bowl with the shallots, capers and cornichons, if using.
- Add enough mayonnaise to bind, then mix together the olive oil and vinegar and add just enough to give a little sharpness to the salad.
- Stir in the finely chopped parsley and serve.

🌻 **July & August Gardening Guide: Full Bloom & Fruiting Glory**

July and August are vibrant, productive months in the garden. With long days and warm temperatures, there's much to enjoy -and plenty to do -to keep your plants flourishing. Here's a combined guide to help you make the most of high summer and prepare for the seasonal transition ahead.



General Garden Care

Water wisely: Water early morning or late evening to minimise evaporation. In August, switch to deep, less frequent watering to promote strong root systems.

Mulch and weed: A good mulch keeps moisture in and weeds down. Stay on top of weeding - summer growth is fast and weeds compete with your plants for nutrients.

Deadhead often: Remove faded flowers from bedding plants, roses, and perennials throughout both months to prolong blooming.

Watch for pests: Keep an eye out for aphids, red spider mites, vine weevils and cabbage white caterpillars - especially on the undersides of leaves.

Lawn care: Mow regularly, but keep the blade higher in dry spells. Water lawns during extended dry periods to prevent browning.

Flower Garden

Prune and trim:

In **July**, prune back wisteria shoots to about 5-6 leaves.

In **August**, lightly trim lavender just after flowering - avoid cutting into woody stems.

Support and stake: Tall plants like delphiniums and dahlias need tying in to avoid wind damage.

Sow for the future:

In **July**, sow biennials like foxgloves, wallflowers and sweet williams for next spring.

In **August**, sow hardy annuals like poppies and cornflowers for earlier blooms next year.

Divide and rejuvenate: After flowering, divide bearded irises to keep them healthy and vigorous.

Plant for autumn: Get ahead by planting autumn-flowering bulbs such as colchicums and autumn crocuses.



Fruit & Vegetable Garden

Harvest regularly: Keep picking courgettes, beans, tomatoes, raspberries and sweetcorn to encourage continuous cropping.

Feed and thin:

Apply high-potash feeds to fruiting vegetables and containers.

Thin apples, plums and pears to improve fruit size and prevent branch damage.

Summer pruning: Espalier and cordon-trained apples and pears benefit from a summer prune to maintain shape and boost fruiting.

Sow for late and winter crops:

In **July**, sow beetroot, lettuce, carrots and spring onions.

In **August**, start spinach, spring cabbage and winter lettuce.

Protect crops: Use netting to safeguard ripening berries from birds.



Greenhouse & Containers

Ventilate and shade: Open vents and doors daily to keep air flowing. Use shading or netting to prevent heat stress.

Water often: Container plants may need watering once or twice daily during hot spells.

Feed regularly: A fortnightly liquid feed keeps pots, baskets, and greenhouse crops performing well.

Pest patrol: Check for aphids, whitefly and mildew. Remove affected leaves and water at the base to reduce disease risk.



Looking Ahead

Order spring bulbs: Now's the time to order daffodils, tulips, crocuses and alliums for autumn planting.

Save seeds: Collect seeds from favourites like calendulas, poppies and sweet peas to sow next year.

These two high-summer months offer a mix of abundance and anticipation. With a little care, your garden can stay productive and beautiful right through to autumn - and beyond. Happy gardening!

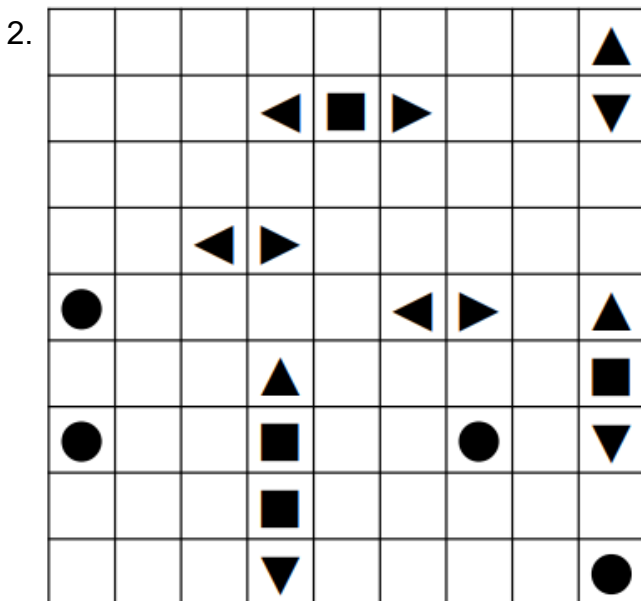

3. Six - Replacing the 1 ♥ value from scale B into scale A gives:-

$$1 \spadesuit + 1 \clubsuit + 1 \diamond = 9 \heartsuit, \text{ thus } 2 \diamond = 8 \spadesuit + 1 \diamond = 4 \spadesuit$$

Multiplying scale B by 4 gives

$$4 \spadesuit + 4 \diamond = 4 \heartsuit \text{ and}$$

Converting the ♠'s values to ♦'s gives

$$1 \diamond + 4 \diamond = 4 \heartsuit, \text{ so } 5 \diamond = 4 \heartsuit.$$
