Dear Friends

The days are getting longer, the new year is well underway and things change in the church calendar too. After Christmas the next major festival is Easter and, in the run-up, the period of preparation, Lent. Lent comes a bit early this year and you will see that Ash Wednesday (the start of Lent) falls on 18th February. If you are confused about the changing date of Easter, you are not alone! I've often been asked how the date for Easter is calculated and why it changes. The short answer is from ecclesiastical tables (I've seen one going up to the year 3000!).

The longer Wikipedia answer would involve the lunar calendar, the solar calendar, the bible and church history. Which all means that Easter day can fall between 22nd March and the 25th April. The next time we will have the earliest Easter possible will be in the year 2285 (by which time, without serious scientific advancements, we will all be dead!) and the next time we will have the latest date will be 2038 (which, God willing, most of us will see!). 2008 saw Easter day on 23rd March which means you've already experienced the earliest Easter you will ever know because that date won't come around again until 2160!

Throughout the centuries Christians have looked on Lent as a special time of spiritual development (a little bit like giving yourself a spiritual workout or spring clean). As usual our church events will have a Lent theme and we will have a weekly evening special Zoom get-together to make Lent richer. Keep your eye on the church notice board or give either me or Rev Steve a call if you are interested.

Keep Wind Off Woldgate Campaign



Opposition to the Three Oaks Renewable Energy Park Extension Wind Farm

A group of residents has united to oppose plans for a wind farm on Woldgate, between the villages of Rudston and Burton Agnes.

The Keep Wind Off Woldgate campaign has been launched in response to proposals by Ridge Clean Energy to build some of England's tallest onshore wind turbines in this iconic and much-loved landscape.

Known as the Three Oaks Renewable Energy Park Extension, it would involve the construction of six turbines, each standing 495 feet (150 metres) high. If approved, the turbines would dominate views for miles around and dramatically alter the character of the area. They would be significantly taller than the London Eye and notably higher than existing turbines at Lissett and Fraisthorpe.

Wrong place for a wind farm

Campaigners believe Woldgate is entirely unsuitable for industrial-scale energy infrastructure and should be protected for its environmental, cultural and tourism value.

Woldgate is internationally recognised through the work of David Hockney, the world's most celebrated living artist, who created numerous artworks of this Roman road and surrounding landscape over nearly a decade. The wind farm would also be located close to Burton Agnes Hall, one of East Yorkshire's most important historic, visitor attractions.

Woldgate supports a wide variety of wildlife and is a cherished natural amenity for local people. It is regularly enjoyed by walkers, cyclists and horse riders, contributing significantly to residents' wellbeing as well as the local tourism economy.

Start of something even larger

Some residents are also concerned that this development could be only the beginning. Once a National Grid connection is installed, the site could be expanded in future years, increasing the scale and impact of industrial development in the area.

Ridge Clean Energy has already secured planning permission for a 165-acre solar farm north-west of Haisthorpe, adjacent to its proposed wind farm site.

No real benefits

Campaigners question the local benefits of the scheme saying that the development is unlikely to create meaningful long-term jobs, while posing a real risk to tourism-related businesses in the area. They believe the proposed community fund has been misrepresented, as the quoted £5 million would be distributed over a wide area across 40 years and only allocated to successful applicants.

Key concerns

The campaign highlights several major issues:

- Damage to tourism
- Harm to wildlife and habitats
- Devaluation of house prices
- Loss of valued local amenity
- Noise pollution and visual harm

Planning application timeline

Ridge Clean Energy is expected to submit a formal planning application to **East Riding of Yorkshire Council** at the end of February. Once submitted, members of the public will be able to view the plans and submit official objections.

Ornamental Garden:

- Divide snowdrops **in the green** after flowering.
- Cut back **autumn-flowering clematis** (Group 3) to a strong pair of buds.

Vegetables & Fruit:

- Sow broad beans, peas and salad leaves in trays or under cover.
- Prune apple and pear trees by the end of the month.



Maintenance:

- Test soil temperature - if it's 6°C+, you can start sowing hardy seeds outdoors.

Wildlife Tip: Nesting season starts soon - clean bird boxes or install new ones.

Any vessel may be positioned horizontally or vertically, but no part of a vessel touches part of any other vessel, either horizontally, vertically or diagonally.





Wildlife Tips for February - Help Birds Through the Hungry Gap

February is one of the toughest months for birds – natural food is scarce and breeding season is close.



- Keep bird feeders topped up with fat balls, suet pellets, sunflower hearts and peanuts (in mesh feeders).
- Put out fresh water daily for drinking and bathing – shallow dishes are best.
- Clean feeders regularly to help prevent disease.

Leave a Little Untidiness

It's tempting to tidy gardens before spring, but wildlife benefits from patience.

- Leave seed heads, dead stems and leaf piles – they provide food and shelter for insects and small mammals.
- Delay cutting back perennials until March if you can.

Watch Out for Hedgehogs

Hedgehogs are still hibernating in February and can be disturbed easily.

- Check carefully before lighting bonfires or clearing log piles.
- If you find a hedgehog out in daylight, especially if small or lethargic, it may need help – contact British Hedgehog Preservation Society for advice.

Prepare for Frog Season

Frogs and toads will soon be on the move.

- If you have a pond, keep a small area ice-free during cold spells.
- Check garden paths and drains for stranded amphibians, especially after mild, wet nights.



Feed the Soil, Not Just the Plants

Healthy soil supports insects, birds and mammals.

- Add compost or leaf mould rather than chemicals.
- Avoid slug pellets – many are harmful to birds and hedgehogs.

Look Out for Early Signs of Spring

- Snowdrops and aconites appearing
- Birds starting to sing more boldly
- Frogs gathering in ponds towards the end of the month

Rudston's Recipes

BEETROOT & GOAT'S CHEESE HEART-SHAPED TARTS

Ingredients (Makes 2-4 hearts)

- 1 sheet of ready-rolled puff pastry
- 1 medium cooked beetroot, thinly sliced
- 100g goat's cheese
- 1 red onion, thinly sliced
- 1 tbsp balsamic vinegar
- 1 tsp sugar
- 1 tbsp olive oil
- 1 egg, beaten (for glazing)
- A few thyme leaves (optional)

Method

- Preheat oven to 200°C / 180°C fan / Gas mark 6. Line a baking tray.
- In a pan, cook the onion in olive oil for 10 minutes until soft. Add balsamic and sugar; cook 5 minutes more until sticky.
- Cut 2-4 heart shapes out of the puff pastry using a cutter or by hand. Score a smaller heart inside each to create a border.
- Spread caramelised onion in the centre, top with beetroot slices and chunks of goat's cheese. Sprinkle with thyme.
- Brush edges with egg and bake for 15-20 minutes until golden and puffed.

Rudston's Recipes (continued)

CHOCOLATE & RASPBERRY MOLTEN HEART PUDDINGS

Ingredients (Serves 2)

100g dark chocolate (70%)

100g butter

2 eggs

50g caster sugar

25g plain flour

A few raspberries (plus extra to serve)

Icing sugar or cream (to serve)

Method

- Preheat oven to 200°C / 180°C fan / Gas mark 6.
- Grease two ramekins and dust with cocoa.
- Melt chocolate and butter together gently, then cool slightly.
- In a separate bowl, whisk eggs and sugar until pale and fluffy.
- Fold in the melted chocolate, then sift in the flour and mix.
- Pour half the batter into ramekins, place 2-3 raspberries in the centre of each and cover with remaining batter.
- Bake for 10-12 minutes until just set on top but still wobbly.
- Turn out onto plates and serve with cream and extra raspberries.



2. Eight – a ♥ & a ♠ = a ♦ (scale A), so replace the ♦ in scale B with a ♥ & a ♠; thus making 2 ♠'s & a ♥ balance 5 ♥'s. Cancelling out one ♥ from either side of scale B shows that 2 ♠'s weigh the same as 4 ♥'s, so one ♠ = 2 ♥'s. Now replace the ♠ in scale A with 2 ♥'s, so that 3 ♥'s = 1 ♦. In scale C, exchange each ♦ for 3 ♥'s, so that 15 ♥'s plus the one that is already in scale C gives a total of 16 ♥'s. Since one ♠ = 2 ♥'s (above), a total of 8 ♠'s are needed to balance scale C.
