As I write we are due to interview, for the post of part time vicar, on Wednesday 20th May with a view to the Bishop of Hull installing any successful candidate into the benefice on Tuesday 16th June at 7pm at Kilham. Until the interview is complete, we cannot confirm that date but it is in the Bishop's diary! The replacement for Glyn will be part time and will be shared between the eight Churches in the benefice and therefore the new person will be very stretched in terms of time available to maintain the smooth running of the whole benefice.

We continue to offer the usual Sunday services and also services to celebrate and thank God at the milestones of the journey through life. Through baptism we thank God for the gift of life, in marriage public vows are exchanged with God's blessing and through funeral services friends and family express their grief and give thanks for the life which is now complete in this world and commend the person into God's keeping.

June is always a quiet month in the Church diary as we recover, this year, from having celebrated Pentecost, and the coming of the Holy Spirit to the early disciples, on May 24th and then Trinity Sunday on May 31st when we celebrated Father, Son and Holy Spirit and the true nature of God. 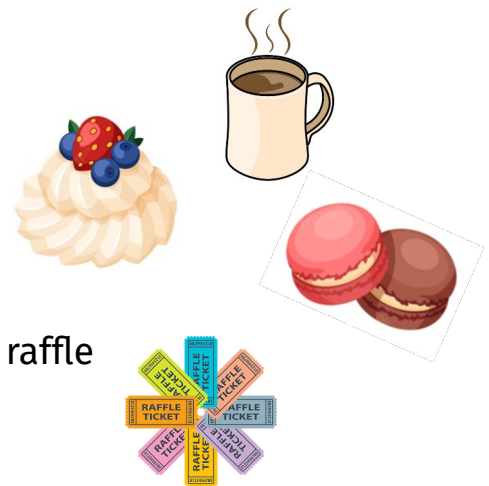

UNDERSTANDING THE PARISH COUNCIL PRECEPT

A quick guide to what it is, how it's calculated, and how it benefits your community.

What is the Parish Council Precept?

The Precept is the Parish Council's share of your Council Tax. It provides funding for the Parish Council to carry out its work and deliver services in your local area.

How is it calculated?

Each year, the Parish Council:

1. Reviews the services, projects and upkeep it plans to deliver.
2. Works out how much this will cost.
3. Subtracts any income it expects (from grants, donations etc.).
4. The remaining amount is what it asks the District Council to collect through the Council Tax – this is the Precept.

This total is shared between local households, based on their Council Tax band. The Council Tax Base for 2026/2027 for Rudston Parish Council is 181.0 for Band D equivalents. This has resulted in a slight reduction of 0.34% from the tax base set in 2025/2026.

What is it used for?

The Precept helps fund a range of local services and improvements, such as:

- Maintaining play areas, open spaces, memorials.
- Providing noticeboards, signs and defibrillators.
- Supporting community events, local groups and village initiatives.
- Commenting on planning applications.
- Speaking up for the community on local issues.

Why does it matter?

Your Precept helps keep the community a great place to live. It enables the Parish Council to respond to local needs, maintain public spaces and invest in village life.

Opposite is a breakdown of how the Precept was spent in the 2025/2026 Financial Year.

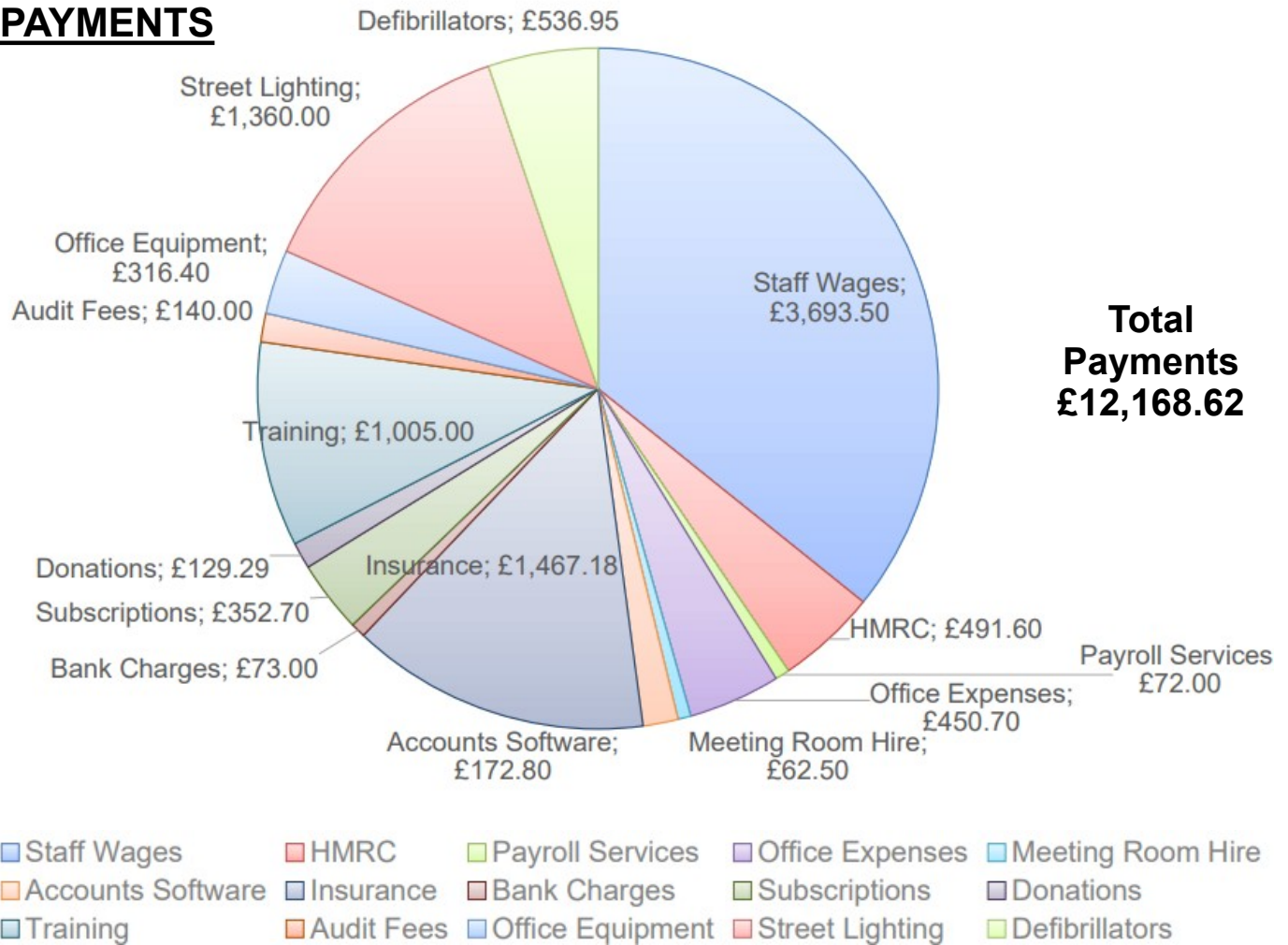

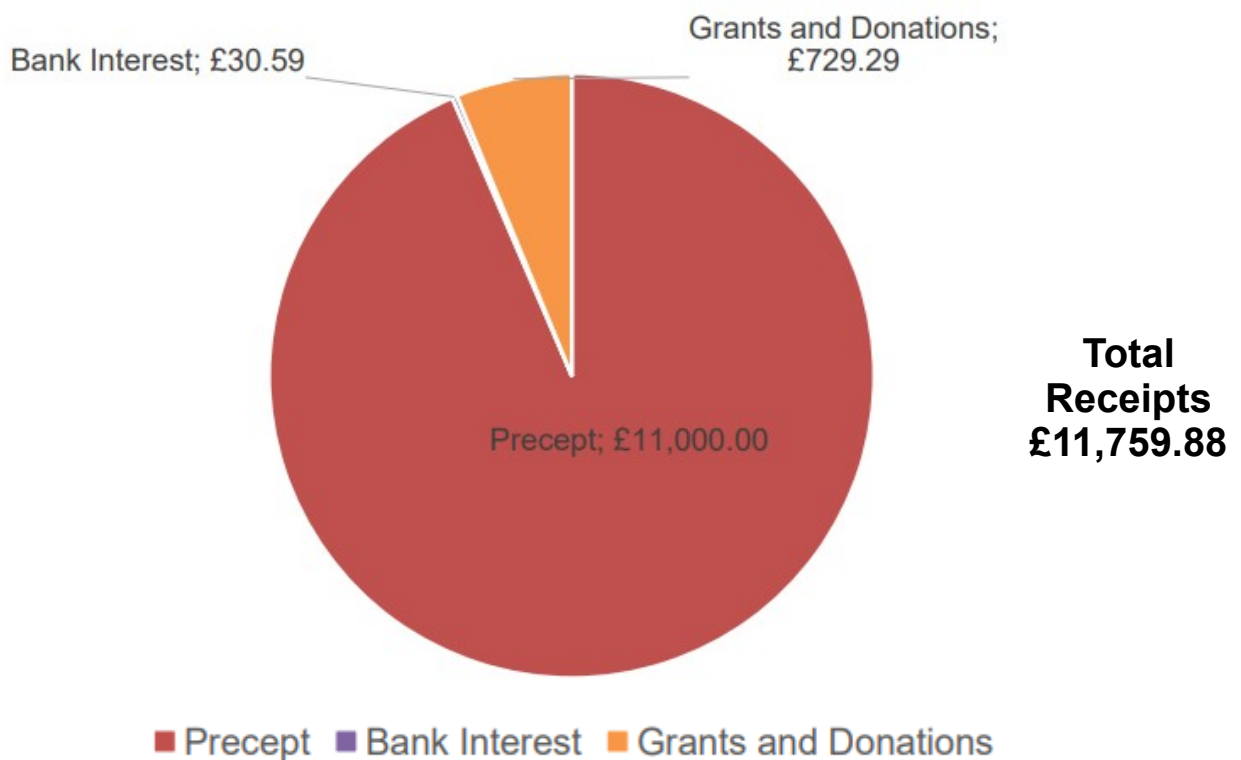

There's plenty happening at the Bosville Arms this June, with a great mix of entertainment, social events, food nights and community gatherings planned throughout the month.

The month's special events include live music from the Three15 Band on Saturday 13th June. The acoustic duo will be performing a mix of modern, retro and folk-pop favourites, offering something for everyone to enjoy. Father's Day on Sunday 21st June will also be marked with a special Sunday Lunch service, with early booking recommended to avoid disappointment.

Regular favourites continue throughout June, including the ever-popular Quiz Night on Sunday 31st May (slightly earlier than normal) and Bosville Bites & Banter on Wednesday 3rd from 12.00pm to 2.30pm - a relaxed opportunity for locals to catch up over lunch.

Wind Farm Threat Looms Over Rudston



The Keep Wind of Woldgate campaign group is warning that the proposed wind farm could permanently industrialise the Woldgate landscape and transform the character of the countryside around Rudston, Burton Agnes, Kilham and Carnaby.

Although the formal planning application for the Three Oaks Renewable Energy Park Extension has not yet been submitted, campaigners believe it is imminent. Once the application is lodged, residents will be able to submit formal objections through the East Riding of Yorkshire Council planning portal.

Environmental nuisance not friend

The proposal from Ridge Clean Energy would see six wind turbines, each standing around 150 metres high, built on elevated farmland close to our villages and sensitive wildlife habitats. Alongside the turbines would come battery storage units, access roads, cabling and large hard-standing areas.

Opponents say the reality behind the “green energy” branding is far from environmentally friendly.

Thousands of tonnes of concrete would be poured into the ground for turbine foundations, which would remain after the turbines’ lifespan. Campaigners argue that productive farmland would be lost and rural habitats disrupted in what they describe as the industrialisation of the Yorkshire Wolds.

Don’t believe the hype

Residents are being urged not to “believe the spin” from Ridge Clean Energy, the company behind the proposal. Campaigners point out that the business is backed by American investment money and claim its primary interest is financial gain rather than protecting the environment or local communities.

Rudston resident Michelle Foster said: “People are being sold a vision of clean, harmless energy, but the reality is huge industrial machinery dominating one of the most peaceful parts of the Wolds. Once this landscape is changed, it is changed forever and will potentially lead to a proliferation of additional industrial projects”.

Our area should NOT be industrialised

Campaigners also fear the impact on wildlife around Zig Zag Wood and the wooded areas lining Woldgate, which are home to a wide range of birds and other species.

Michelle Foster added: “This isn’t just about turbines. It’s about battery storage compounds, roads, concrete and infrastructure spreading across open countryside. Local people need to understand the full scale of what is being proposed”.

Opponents argue that the development reflects a wider “gold rush” for renewable energy projects, driven by government policy, with developers and investment companies seeking sites wherever landowners are willing to lease land.

A recent government-backed report suggested that only around two per cent of countryside land would be needed nationally to meet renewable energy targets. Campaigners say the problem is the lack of any clear strategy over where such developments should be located, leading to applications close to villages and environmentally sensitive sites.

Community benefits?

Questions are also being raised over so-called “community benefit” payments often promoted alongside wind farm developments. Campaigners note these payments are often voluntary, not necessarily part of the formal planning process, and can be reduced or withdrawn altogether.

Michelle Foster said: “Communities are often promised benefits, but the people who actually live closest to these developments get next to nothing and are the ones left dealing with the noise, visual impact and loss of the lifestyle they chose”.

What now?

Campaigners are urging residents who value the peace, wildlife and rural character of the area to become involved as the planning process develops.

“This is going to need people power” said Michelle Foster. “If local communities stay silent now, we risk losing the landscape that makes this area special”.

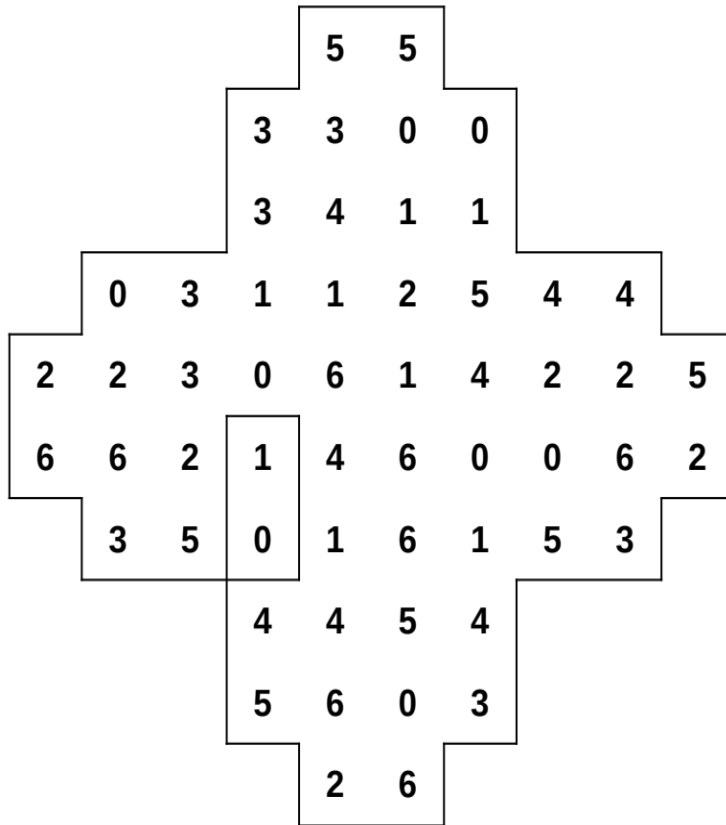

Ornamental Garden:

- Continue **deadheading** for longer flowering.
- Cut back hardy geraniums after flowering to encourage new growth.
- Feed roses and perennials.



Vegetables & Fruit:

- Regularly pick peas and beans to encourage more pods.
- Harvest early potatoes.
- Watch for pests - check brassicas for caterpillars.



Greenhouse:

- Shade, water, and ventilate well.
- Pinch out tomato side shoots and tie in growth.

Wildlife Tip: Keep birdbaths full and plant pollinator-friendly flowers.

Wildlife Tips for June - Fledglings About

June is peak time for young birds leaving the nest.



- If you find a small bird on the ground, it's often a **fledgling**, not abandoned - parents are usually nearby
- Keep dogs on leads near hedges and long grass
- Put out fresh water daily during warm spells

Pollinators Need Space

Insects are at their busiest now.

- Leave patches of long grass or wildflowers to support bees and butterflies
- Plant nectar-rich flowers such as **lavender, scabious, verbena and buddleia**
- Avoid using insecticides - even “targeted” ones can harm beneficial insects

Hedgehogs Active at Night

Hedgehogs are roaming widely in June.

- Check long grass before mowing or strimming
- Leave out shallow water bowls in hot weather
- Make sure garden netting is raised or removed to prevent entanglement



Butterflies on the Wing

June is a great month for butterflies.

- Look out for **orange-tip, small tortoiseshell, peacock and meadow brown**
- Nettles are important caterpillar food - leave a patch if you can

Think Before Tidying

A bit of mess helps wildlife.

- Leave seed heads and wildflowers to set seed
- Stack logs or branches in quiet corners for beetles and frogs
- Delay major garden clear-ups until later in summer

Enjoy Summer Nature

- Swifts screaming overhead on warm evenings
- Bats emerging at dusk
- Dragonflies hunting over ponds and ditches





Rudston's Recipes

SMOKEY BBQ BEEF & CHORIZO BURGERS

Ingredients (Makes 4 burgers)

400g beef mince

100g chorizo, finely chopped

1 small red onion, grated

1 garlic clove, crushed

1 tbsp smoked paprika

1 tsp Dijon mustard

Salt & pepper

Burger buns, lettuce, cheese, etc. (for serving)

Optional BBQ glaze:

2 tbsp ketchup

1 tbsp brown sugar

1 tbsp cider vinegar

1 tsp Worcestershire sauce

Method

- Mix the beef, chorizo, onion, garlic, paprika, mustard, salt and pepper in a bowl. Shape into 4 patties.
- Chill in the fridge for at least 30 minutes to firm up.
- Heat a grill or barbecue and cook burgers for 4-5 minutes per side (longer if thick).
- If using glaze, brush on during the last minute of cooking.
- Serve in toasted buns with your choice of toppings - cheese, gherkins, lettuce, or grilled onions.

Rudston's Recipes (continued)

CHOCOLATE GUINNESS CAKE WITH CREAM CHEESE FROSTING

Ingredients (serves 8-10)

For the cake:

250ml Guinness	1 tsp vanilla extract
250g unsalted butter	140ml sour cream
75g cocoa powder	275g plain flour
400g caster sugar	2½ tsp bicarbonate of soda
2 eggs	

For the frosting:

200g cream cheese
100g icing sugar
100ml double cream

Method

- Preheat oven to 180°C / 160°C fan / gas mark 4. Grease and line a 23cm springform tin.
- Heat Guinness and butter in a pan until melted. Whisk in cocoa and sugar.
- Beat sour cream with eggs and vanilla, then add to the chocolate mixture.
- Stir in flour and bicarbonate of soda. Pour into the tin and bake for 45-60 minutes, or until a skewer comes out clean.
- Cool completely in the tin.
- For the frosting, beat cream cheese and icing sugar until smooth, then whisk in cream until thick and spreadable.
- Spread over the cooled cake to resemble a pint of stout with a creamy head.

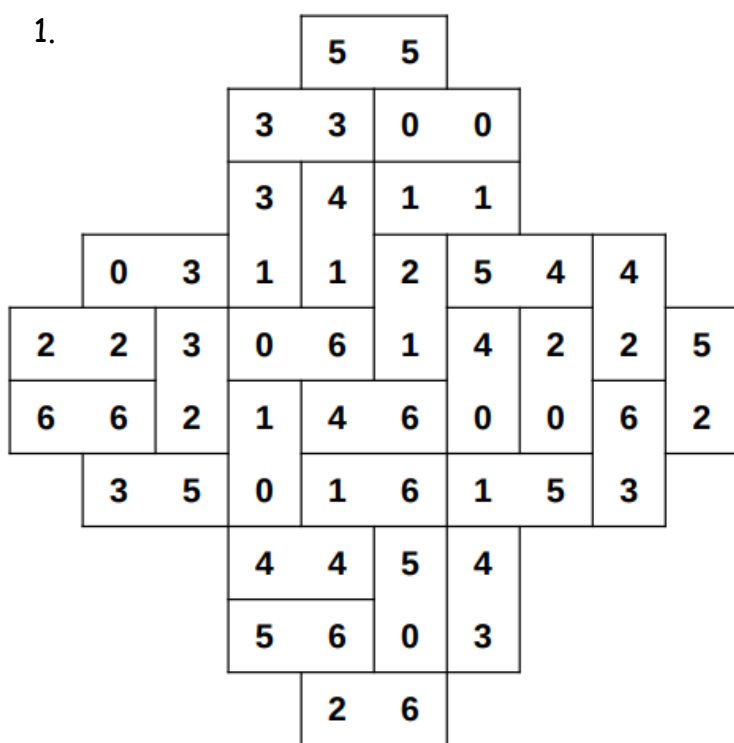
