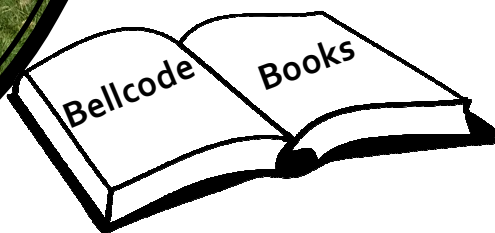

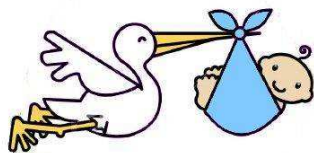
Thank you to all those people who help with deliveries and to Shirley Harland who proof reads this news letter and also compiles the word search every month.

Dear Friends,

Easter is coming and just in case it had slipped my mind I was reminded last week. On the squash court, just before the start of the game, my opponent asked me; 'which is the most important; Easter or Christmas?' Perhaps a better question for in the pub rather than at the start of a game but it set me thinking. On the one hand God taking human form through Jesus (which of course we celebrate at Christmas) is pretty important but on the other hand the Easter celebration of Jesus' resurrection from the dead and the apostles transforming experience of the risen Jesus is important too. What do you think?



One thing I do know is Holy Week and Easter are an intense and vital part of our faith. At one end of Holy Week we have Palm Sunday and the hollow welcome of Jesus, on a donkey, into Jerusalem.

The extremes of Holy Week can be all too present in our lives and faith too. We never know what's round the corner. But the Easter story and Jesus' resurrection show us that whatever the situation God is at work and has the power to bring light into even the darkest places.

Our faith and the structure of our seasonal church services help to bring this truth alive for us. So may the Joy of the resurrected Jesus be us with this Easter and always.

From June Sellers (Social Committee)

You may be interested to know that I am keen to offer an illustrated talk about the work that the RSPB is doing with farmers and landowners in the Wolds and Coast area to enhance the wildlife and flora. We are keen to involve local communities and would welcome an opportunity to speak to villagers in the area. Rudston is one of the key villages from our point of view. The talk explains how farmers are creating habitats for wildlife on their farms by sowing wild bird seed mixes, creating nest sites for skylarks, putting up nest boxes for barn owls and tree sparrows, sowing nectar flower and wild flower mixes for bees etc. The talk is illustrated with numerous pictures of the Wolds and Coast and considers the landscape, archaeology, history of the Wolds as well as the wildlife. Gardening Corner

We have just stewed the last of our “keeping” apples, I love Stewed apple at tea time. The crop of Bramleys, last year, was a big one but the fruit was small, lack of water at the important time of growth. This is the month when a lot of apple varieties come into full blossom, others wait till May.



Most varieties need another sort to allow fertilisation and a good set of embryo fruits, so where there are a few different varieties being grown in a village or parish there is usually no problems. There are however a few that need two other varieties near by. Bramley Seedling, the well known cooker is one of these. One way to help these is to cut a few shoots from a crab apple, when in flower, place them in water and put them under the apple trees in your garden. This allows the bees and other insects to transfer the pollen from one to the other. In commercial orchards mixed planting can overcome pollination problems.

There is still time to do any grafting of top fruits, and feed soft fruit bushes if not already done so. A general fertiliser helps to make new shoots for the next fruiting season. Any plants offered for sale should be well hardened off before planting out, especially any of the popular floral bedding varieties.

I'm sowing runner beans into small pots, then hope to plant out at the end of May when all chance of frost has passed.

Leeks are one of the best winter vegetables, also excellent for making soup. So now is the time to sow some in pots, and a few outside directly into the soil. The best blanch leeks are “Oarsman” and “Neptunes” and for late ones the well known favourite “Mussleburgh”. Leeks like a well manured soil.

Finally sow winter cabbage at the end of this month. Keep sowing a few lettuce and the pea family, carrots and white turnips. A farmer friend tells me it's too early to sow my favourite winter veg' the swede turnip !!

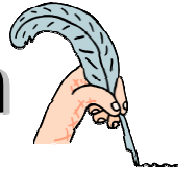

This month's contribution is being mostly prepared before the parish council meeting of 25th March, but will hopefully be updated before submission. In “matters arising” however, it can be reported that the telephone box now belongs to the parish council. (We shall probably still refer to it as that, even though there is no longer a telephone). It comes with a list of instructions on maintenance, and our member Mr. Warcup has volunteered to look after it. When I came to put up the official notice inside, I was a little taken aback to find an estate agents “For Sale” sign propped up in there! Whether it had been placed there for temporary safe-keeping, or whether simply a prank, at least the company soon removed it after being informed.

Notification came through at the beginning of the month that the Tree Preservation Order mentioned last time has been granted, so the Bunkers Hill trees are now under protection.

The next big thing will be elections in early May. There will be the small matter of national ones of course, with those exciting (!) T.V. debates already under way, but also parish council ones. Current members had forms to complete, which I have to deliver to Beverley in early April. At the time of writing not everyone has completed their forms, and we don't know whether there are prospective new candidates which would bring the total above 11 requiring your votes in an election proper.

Personally I shall be “frowning my brow” before that though. The parish council's financial year-end being 31st March, there are the accounts to balance as soon as possible after that. The annual audit timetable has been received, and though reasonable, the “Viewing the books” period will be interrupted by the first meeting after elections. However the accounts themselves should be ready for the required date of 8th May. Official notice will appear on the notice board in due course, and dates confirmed in the next newsletter.

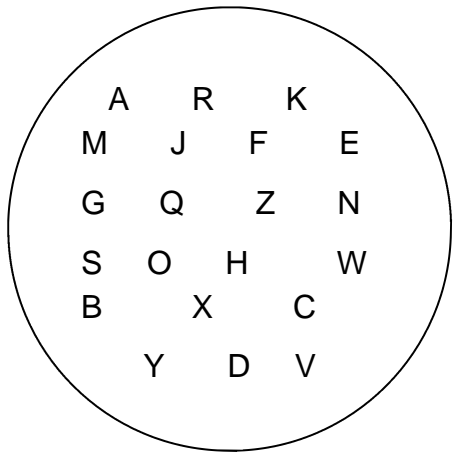
