

RUDSTON HERITAGE HISTORY GROUP

In October John Walker told us about life in Rudston in the 1800's. This was largely based on the "Constable's Book" a record of the spending of the parish Constable, which gave a fascinating insight into life in Rudston. Amounts were recorded for spending on the control of sparrows, on parish relief, on repairs to parish property such as the bridge and the sheep wash

John pointed out the poverty that many people would have lived in at the time, and the friendly societies such as "Ancient Shepherds" provided help such as an income during sickness, and medical help for those who had paid a subscription into the club.

The talk was illustrated with wonderful old photos.

In November our meeting was in church and we welcomed speakers from the Yorkshire Wolds Railway who told us about the "Malton Dodger". This name was given to the Malton to Driffield trains as the stations were often some distance from the villages they served!

We were told something of the history of the line, from the first trains running in 1853, to the peak of the service in 1902 and the final closure in 1958. In 2008 the Yorkshire Wolds Railway Restoration project began with the aim of creating a heritage railway based at Fimber, there is now a short length of restored track, with an engine, a visitor centre and more to come.

The second half of the evening we travelled along the line, with photos and maps of each station, often with contemporary photos showing the station buildings still in existence – or not. The speakers had brought lots of interesting material for us to see. For more information see www.yorkshirewoldsrailway.org.uk

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William Pride

William's name appears on the Rudston war memorial as "WILLIAM PRIDE, Munition worker"

The 1881 census shows us William aged 5, living with his family at Thorpe Hall, where his father William is coachman. In 1891 William is Footman at The Hall, Hildenby, near Malton. His employer is Sir Charles Strickland who was owner of Boynton Hall. There were 11 domestic servants in the household, including William's sister Charlotte, who was nursemaid. The household also

included Sir Charles's nephew Henry Marriott, who was the estate manager. and is a relation of Mr Richard Marriott, who now owns Boynton Hall. In 1901 William is a footman in a house in Grosvenor Square, London.

In 1911 William is the butler at Thorpe Hall, one of 15 domestic servants of Sir Alexander and Lady Alice Macdonald. Continued on page 10

William Pride (cont)

At some time after this William moved to Watford and became a shopkeeper and munitions worker at Watford No 1 works, at Bushey Mill Lane, near the railway station. On the morning of 13th February 1917 a fire broke out in the powder mixing room. The Watford Fire Brigade and teams from local works attended and many hundreds of girl workers were evacuated. The fire was prevented from spreading and firemen, led by the Superintendent carried boxes of explosives out of the burning building. There were no reports of the events at the time because of wartime security, and the gallantry medals given to the firemen were not awarded until after the war. Two men from the mixing room. Charles Moorcroft and William Pride were injured. They were taken to hospital, but died of their injuries.

I think William must have been buried in Watford, but I have been unable to find out any more about this.

William Pride senior died in 1899 and it seems that the rest of the family moved to London. William senior is buried alone in Rudston churchyard, near the monolith and the inscription on his grave says:

I look for the resurrection of the dead and the life of the world to come, WILLIAM PRIDE, died at Thorpe December 26th 1899 aged 55 years This stone was erected by ALEXANDER WENTWORTH MACDONALD BOSVILLE and ALICE EDITH his wife in memory of a faithful friend and servant who had lived as coachman at Thorpe Hall for over twenty nine years Most of the research was done by Frederick and Michelle Stephens of Bridlington.

Boynton School Class 3

Our names are Erin and Gracie and we are Y6 children at Boynton Primary School and we would like to tell you about some of the things we have been doing this term. We think our class is the best class ever because we do lots of fun things and learn loads at the

same time. This term we are learning about World War I; we are expanding our minds by researching harrowing and heroic information about the Great War. Sometimes it can be quite gruesome too, like when we learnt about trench foot! We are really enjoying this topic and can't wait to learn even more!



To help with our learning, we went on an amazing trip to Ryedale Folk Museum, which is an outdoor educational museum, on Wednesday 24th October. We were able to use the skills we learned here to show the rest of the classes in our school and we even did a special assembly for our parents.

In literacy, the Y5's in our class have written beautiful poetry through the eyes of a soldier in the trenches about what they could hear, see and feel. It was really hard for them to imagine what it could be like but they got there in the end! One of the lines from Darci's poem was 'The taste of victory of this strong fight I fought is bitter in my mouth as I lay dying, dying...' They are amazing!

Sculpture was the theme in art and we used chicken wire, cardboard boxes and papier-mache to build our own trenches which we think are real masterpieces. We used: lolly sticks; shreddies for sand bags; mud and wire wool and they look very realistic and fit well with this time of year.



On Wednesday 20th November we had a whole afternoon to make some WWI themed decorations for a Christmas tree festival at St Johns Church in Bridlington. We made footballs to represent the Christmas truce, poppies to represent the fields of Flanders and doves for the Christmas spirit and to represent peace. We had a really good time and made some amazing crafts and working with the younger children in the school. This half term we are going to create a menu of trench food for us to plan, prepare, cook and taste. We are really looking forward to it (we just hope it's not too disgusting!)


