


everyone present. The tombola was an added success and boosted W.I. funds by £170 so thanks for the prizes and your generosity in 'having a go'.

Dear Sirs

I am writing to you about the traffic using East Gate, Rudston. Over the years the traffice has increased and so has the speed, some vehicles are definitely over the 30 mile limit for a residential area. The Traffic is coming from the Kilham Road and Burton Agnes Roads

We now have Caravans, Motorhomes and Commercial Traffic being directed down East Gate, by SatNav. instead of straight down Long Street, which brings the traffic to the same road the B1253. Long Street is a straight and wider road than East Gate and is a far better road (see photos enclosed of East Gate)

Most of the day the road is single traffic, A small bridge set at an angle leading to a bad corner. I am surprised there hasnt been an accident on this corner. Cars take the corner wide going out into the middle of the road to see round the corner if there is any traffic. Cyclists are directed down East Gate, Children on Horses are regularly seen, they need some protection from the drivers.

After the corner on East Gate there is a single track road up to the church and the turn to the right then a left turn, that brings you to the B1253 .

A few years ago we had a dog knocked down on East Gate it took the driver about 100yards to stop. If something not done there will be a bad accident on this road. I am not the only resident of East Gate who feels worried about the traffic problem. Please see something is done about it soon.

# THE WANDER INN "POP UP PUB" In the Village Hall Saturday December 14th

## PUB HOURS 7pm - 11pm Last orders 10.45pm



Dr Woods told us that the Wold Newton Hoard is one of the largest and best excavated coin hoards. It was found in September 2014 near Wold Newton., the metal detectorists who found it sent the hoard in its pot to the British Museum and it was declared to be Treasure. The pot was X-raved and then the 1.857 coins were carefully unpacked. The Hoard was valued at £44,000 and the Yorkshire Museum raised the funds to enable them to buy it. The coins were generally in very good condition. They were cleaned and the coins and pot are on display at the Museum.

The coins in the Hoard are dated at around 300AD and Dr Woods gave a brief history of the Roman Empire at around this time. The dates of the coins in the post mean that the time when it was buried can be dated at late 307 AD to early 308AD.

The size of the Hoard and the fragile nature of the pot it was in indicate that the pot was not filled with coins and then buried, rather the pot was put in the earth (it may have been hidden beneath a floor rather than buried) and then the coins were put into it. This could have taken place over several years and represent savings of one wealthy person or of a community. The value of the Hoard is equivalent to 41/2 years wages for a legionary soldier. It is known that the Roman population in the area at the time included wealthy people - such as those who lived in the Rudston villa

Interestingly the Hoard found at Langtoft included coins of the same era, and larger hoards seem to be more common for the period of 305 to 308AD and more hoards from this time are found in Northern areas. This indicates an influx of coinage into the area at the time, it may have been that money came into the area to pay the army, or that when the Emporer came to York he brought a large amount of coinage with him. The Hoard will be the subject of study for many years to come.

### L Cpl James Etherington



Last year Frederick and Michelle Stephenson of Bridlington did a lot of research on the war dead of the High Street in Bridlington, using as a starting point Chris Bonnett's book. They then researched the war dead of Rudston. I was intrigued by James Etherington, who is buried in Rudston churchyard in a War Graves Commission grave, but whose name is not on the war memorial in the village.

The names on the war memorial are of the men who were born in; or lived in Rudston village and neither of these applied to James. Why then is he buried here – here is a little bit of his story.

James was born in Barnard Castle, the son of Joseph Etherington, who was a carpet weaver.

In December of 1910 James was married at Rudston to Charlotte Annie Hall. He was aged 25 and she was 26. Charlotte was the Assistant School Mistress. She lived at 2 Bunkers Hill Cottage (near the War memorial) with her mother Mary Burton, her step father George, a Tailor and George's father Richard who although aged 82 was described as a Carrier. James's occupation on the Marriage certificate was given as Compositor.

The family who lived next door at 1 Bunkers Hill Cottage were the Claxtons whose son William was killed in France in April 1916.

James and Charlotte lived in Redcar and had two daughters, lvy born in 1911 and Mina born in 1912. James enlisted in Redcar and became a Lance Corporal, 3rd Battalion, Alexandra, Princess of Wales's Own (Yorkshire Regiment) James died on 15<sup>th</sup> August 1917 in Hartlepool by drowning.

I have not managed to find any more information about his death, but in Darlington a grave has the following inscription:

Private Thomas William Řeed, 3<sup>rd</sup> Yorks Only son of GM and M J Reed Was accidentally drowned Whilst saving a comrade at Hartlepool August 15<sup>th</sup> 1917 aged 22 years In the midst of life we are in death

So it seems as though there was an incident in which James and Thomas, and possibly others as well, drowned. Continued on page 12 From page 11

As a widow with two small children it is quite likely that Charlotte returned to live at home with the support of her family and wanted James to be buried at Rudston churchyard. Maybe she lived at Rudston for a while, later she lived in Bridlington at Salisbury Terrace.

Charlotte remarried in 1938, her husband was Frederick Snow. At the time of their marriage she was 56 and he was 69 In 1939 they were living in St John's Avenue South in Bridlington; Frederick was described as a retired teacher. Ivy and Mina were both living with them and both described as Teachers.

Frederick died in 1940 and Charlotte died in 1975 in Huntingdon Cambridgeshire. Maybe she had gone to live with one of her daughters.

Charlotte lived to the age of 91, and was married twice, but she spent most of her adult life as a widow and her two marriages were both overshadowed by World Wars.

Thank you to Frederick and Michelle who did the original work on James's life.


