The December meeting of the History Group started with Dr. John Walker giving a short talk on the early history of Rudston and showing a series of interesting pictures and maps, including some very old pictures of the church tower, and of the interior of the church.

A plan of the churchyard showed us that it was originally circular in shape. This was usual as a churchyard would not have corners where the devil could hide!

We had a chance to share treasures which had been brought by members, including some archaeological finds, and a book on the history of Rudston which included a description of the measuring of the monolith in 1872. The meeting finished with tea, coffee and mince pies.

At the time of writing the January meeting of the history group is still in the future, but having heard Mr Rick Hudson's talk on the Lost Houses of Bridlington at another history group I know that it is an excellent presentation and will have been much enjoyed.

The February meeting will be on Thursday 23<sup>rd</sup> February at 7pm in the Village Hall when Mr Andrew Woods of the Yorkshire Museum will tell us about the Coin Hoard of Wold Newton.

### Memorable Moments

When asked about memorable moments from 24 parish council years, the one that immediately springs to mind is when the parish council were summonsed to court over non-payment of bills!

There is quite a history to the site which is now Corner Garden, and at the time that East Riding of Yorkshire Council came into being we were in dispute with their predecessors in Bridlington. After the village tip was closed and landscaped into the two levels seen today it lay derelict for some time. The parish council came up with the idea of making use of the lower level



by creating a car park, which would be free for use by visitors to the monolith and as an over-flow for events at church. The Borough Council were informed and they readily agreed – but omitted to mention that they would then impose rates once it opened after the village had done all the work!

The first demand was received out of the blue a year later. At the next parish council meeting it was clear that members considered it a downright cheek, and it was queried with request that it be withdrawn. It wasn't, and heralded the start of years of intermittent correspondence with neither side inclined to give way. At one point the escalating amount was even reduced, but by then it was a matter of principle as much as money. Of course, the car park itself had been closed at the start of all this.

If we thought the change in county council would bring an end to the matter we were wrong. Among my post on return from work one evening was a letter bearing the official county court mark.

My first thought was that I had been selected for a second jury duty, but realising it was addressed to me as Clerk to Rudston Parish Council hurriedly opened it. The summons was in my name too. It was not a nice feeling and I was soon imagining appearing in the dock handcuffed to a policeman!

Anyway, I rang my chairman, who in 1998 was the vicar, Revd. Stephen Cope. Those who remember Stephen won't be surprised that he immediately told me not to worry and he would "give 'em their day in court". (Cometh the hour . . .)

I spent the next few evenings noting all I could find in parish council minutes relating to the site in question, which I typed out for the vicar to take with him on the day appointed in Beverley. He said he would take it in his "ecclesiastical" brief-case for added effect!

However, he met the county council representative before-hand outside court, and on explaining the parish council position to him, it was agreed that the charge was unjust and the hearing cancelled.

Unfortunately that wasn't the end of the matter. Another summons appeared a few weeks later. It turned out that the East Riding County Council officer had been reprimanded over taking action without consultation, and this time the Treasurer himself would attend court. The outcome was the same though. Revd. Cope met him before the appointed time, and managed to persuade him likewise. Once again the case was cancelled, and this time so were all charges.

A year or two later a Hunmanby chap fancied the site as a depot for his business, but he was eventually "seen off". It now definitely belongs to the parish council and there should be no further argument!

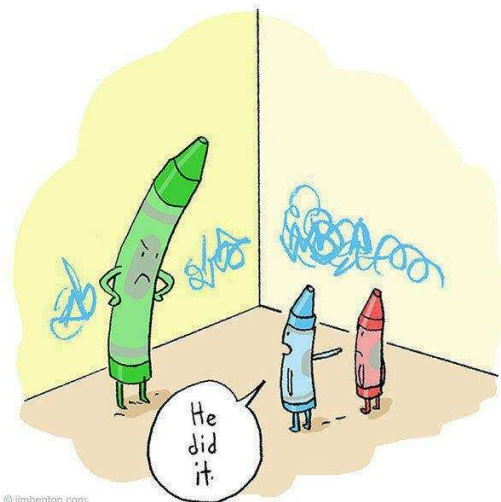

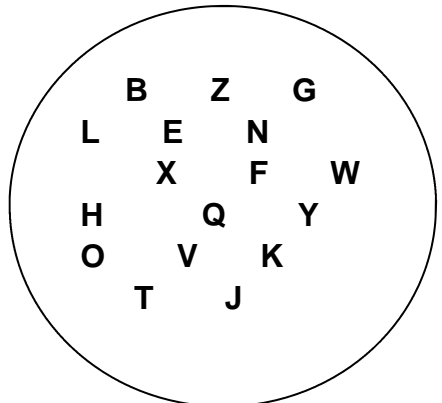
