From the Parish Magazine of 1895

January Rudstone

PARISH COUNCIL – The first Parish Meeting under the Local Government Act of 1894 was held in the Schoolroom on Tuesday evening, December 4th for the election of a Parish Council. The Rev C S Booty, Vicar, was voted to the chair. Seventeen valid nominations were handed in for the 11 seats on the Council. Four of the proposed candidates withdrew, which reduced the numbers to 13. A show of hands was then taken, which resulted in the following 11 being declared to be elected: Messrs W Bannister, W Berriman, A W M Bosville, W J Burdass, J A Coulson, Jos Cranswick, Garton, W Sedman, R Walker, Geo Wilson and W Wilson. No poll was demanded and the meeting passed off very quietly and pleasantly.

FIRST MEETING OF PARISH COUNCIL – The Parish Council held their first meeting on Tuesday evening, December 18th. After signing a declaration of acceptance of office,. They elected the Rev C S Booty, Vicar, Chairman of the Council; Mr Bosville Vice-Chairman and Mr Danby Clerk. The appointment of a Treasurer was postponed to the next meeting, which was fixed for Tuesday, January 15th next. A small Committee was appointed to draw up "Standing Orders" for the regulation of the Council's proceedings.

Mr Bosville and Mr Geo Wilson have been elected, without a poll, to represent the Parish on the District Council.

Who were the people mentioned? I looked at the census entries to try to find out something about them. In some cases I couldn't be sure I was looking at the right person and in some I couldn't find anything at all.

Mr Booty was of course the Vicar. Welbourn Bannister was tailor, draper and grocer. I could not see a Sm Berriman, but there was a Wm Berriman, who was head gardener at Thorpe. A W M Bosville was a gentleman of Thorpe Hall. W T Burdass was a farmer of Manor House. Jos Cranswick was a farmer of Eastgate House. No Christian name is given for Mr Garton, indicating that he was the only Mr Garton of that name. I have found John, Edward and Wm Garton, all farm workers. John and Edward both lived at Long Street Cottages. Wm Garton worked at Glebe Farm. Wm Sedman was a labourer of Nightingale Row. Geo Wilson was a farmer of Rudston Grange. Wm Wilson was a farmer of High Caythorpe and was my husband John's Great grandfather. Mr Danby the Clerk was a farmer of Glebe Farm.

Defibrillator Update

We have been successful with a bid to the Lissett Wind Farm Fund for part of the funding of a defibrillator for the village. The remainder of the funding will come from repurposing unspent Local Grant money (mostly from money set aside for clearing snow in previous years).

The defibrillator will be sited in the old telephone box on Middle Street. As part of the installation of the defibrillator, there will be a training course, open to all residents, on how to use it. The defibrillator will be in a secure box which will need a code to get in. This code will be known to the 999 service, so when anyone calls an ambulance, they should inform you of the code to access the defibrillator.

Given the distance to A&E departments from Rudston, this could be a life saver for anyone who has a heart attack.

In writing this at the same time as considering the parish council meeting, there is little to say at the moment, but we do have a pretty full agenda. The good news just heard was the success of the funding for a defibrillator. There will be a separate notice in this issue about that. Also the donation from the Lions organisation was duly received. A heavy duty table & seat for the children's playground was the agreed purchase with the money, which may be already in place. May I take this opportunity to thank the Lions on behalf of the village.

That of course was to mark the Queen's 90th birthday. Other villages have gone in for much more elaborate celebrations, but a supplier to parish councils was reduced to offering bunting etc. at half price at the beginning of June so maybe we weren't the only ones not to go overboard.

It seemed a little strange to be sending off the accounts information while "the books" were still elsewhere, but just a reminder that they are available to view until 15th July at the home of the chairman. The main account is on the website as approved by the "internal auditor", but officially it remains "unaudited" until we receive final approval from afar. It can be confusing, and this year we had an "Annual Governance Statement" to deal with. That was in the form of a tick-box exercise undertaken at the last meeting and passed with flying colours naturally!

Just a comment on the fracking issue. Now that Kirby Misperton has been approved there is a possibility of more local plans coming up, unless they wait for any problems there to become apparent. After all, there is a zoo full of animals who will surely feel any tremors long before us. It makes you wonder if the choice of site was deliberate for that reason. Let's hope Flamingoland staff are on high alert!

After the notice about library service changes last month, we were informed of "Drop-in Sessions" to be held at various times and places in the area. Anyone who saw the poster would see that a Bridlington one took place in June, but there is one in Driffield still to come. That is to be held on Thursday, 14th July, from 1 to 4 p.m. at the "Driffield Centre", Cross Hill. (That's the new name for the refurbished building which ironically used to be just the library).

Premature Obituary?



dead but sleepeth".


A short section of the Lynton & Barnstaple line has indeed been reawakened. Perchance Common Sense may be likewise?


