Anti-social behaviour... Report it!

The East Riding of Yorkshire Council and Humberside Police Force work closely to tackle Anti-social behaviour.

Anti-social behaviour is any aggressive, intimidating or destructive activity that damages or destroys another person's quality of life. Anti-social behaviour can have a serious impact on individuals and whole communities. It reduces feelings of safety and will not be tolerated.

At the East Riding of Yorkshire council, we have a team of officers dedicated to support and protect you and also take action against those who choose to make your life a misery. We firmly believe in early intervention in the East Riding rather than resorting to legal action. We have used early intervention tools successfully for a number of years and this will continue.

For advice and guidance on what you can do if you are suffering from anti-social behaviour or know others whose quality of life is being affected and are too frightened to do anything about it themselves, we encourage you to visit our website at www.eastriding.gov.uk. Our website provides information on anti-social behaviour, what is it, what and who to report an issue to.

If you need to talk to the police about a crime you should contact Humberside Police non-emergency on **101**.

If it is an emergency or there is a crime in progress you should call 999.

To report a crime anonymously call crimestoppers on 0800555111

Volunteer Emergency Telephone System, or VETS.

VETS assists when a lone rescuer must stay with the patient and yet needs help in fetching the community defibrillator. By using a single memorable telephone number, this will ring up to 10 lines at the same time until a helper has been found. VETS is a community run system, and enables up to 10 local resident volunteers to assist pending the arrival of the emergency services. The system can also be used for any emergency where additional help is required from neighbours, whether Cardiac Arrest or not. The availability of VETS gives a level of reassurance to the elderly, those living alone, and to the infirmed, that there is always help on hand.

The caller is played a simple message before VETS volunteers answer. If no answer, continue CPR until other help or ambulance arrives. VETS does not replace 999 calls. Please also note that the volunteer number should be a landline only – not a mobile number.

First & foremost, we would like to send our sincere thanks to the families of The Rudston All Saint's Church for their kindness and for welcoming us so graciously into their community. We greatly enjoyed our tour with Minister John Walker and found him to be highly informative on the vast history of Rudston. We would also like

to offer our thanks to the community around East Yorkshire for their enjoyable company and for Wold B&B in Wold Newton for having us.

In the span of little over a week, we visited over a dozen graveyards, saw even more historical churches and sites, and spoke with many individuals regarding not only our history, but the history of the area. For us this was an eye-opening experience to finally be able to see the places where our family had lived. To quote Ralph Waldo Emerson, "....man is a bundle of relations, a knot of roots, whose flower and fruitage is the world..." As if an embodiment to this phrase, the Rowlin family returned to their "knot of roots" this June of 2017 and saw how their flower bloomed into the wonderful history we have the privilege to study today.

Thanks to the current research being conducted, we can now trace the family tree to Rudston in East Yorkshire as far back as the 1760's. In particular, Newyear Rowlin (#1, as there are so far two of them in our family history) was born and baptized in Rudston in 1761, but would later move to eastward to Bridlington where he would be an oat dealer, miller and baker, according to the White's Directory.

Newyear Rowlin #2, who would be born several years later in 1829 in Bridlington, would later farm in Rudston. According to the 1861 Census in UK, Rudston, Yorkshire, he would be farming 160 acre and it was located at 5 Church Hill lane.


While exploring Rudston, what I think surprised us the most was the lasting pieces of the Rowlin's in Rudston. To be specific, the Rowlin family had once owned the post office in Rudston in 1901. Baron Rowlin's profession was grocer and shopkeeper by trade, however his wife, Sarah, was a postmistress. This business was in fact in her name! Together they had a family of 6 children: Ruby Millicent, Lucy Ann, Beatrice Mary, Sydney, Fred. The location of the former post-office is now formerly used as a glass blowing institute.

Sydney Rowlin was a Sergeant of B Company, 2nd Battalion in The Prince of Wales's Own (West Yorkshire Regiment), 23 Brigade, 8th Division. He was killed in action at Bouchavesnes.

With all that we have learned during our stay, we feel that Rudston holds a very special place in the hearts' of our Rowlin history. We felt privileged to be able to stay and learn and thank everyone once again for their kindness.

To receive and forward on any crime prevention alerts and crime resilience information from East Riding Council/Humberside Police to the residents.

To help East Riding Council/Humberside Police to encourage and empower residents to report crime and share anything they have reported to the Police with their neighbours and the Parish Council.

To help East Riding Council/Humberside Police to encourage residents to report and keep the police informed of any activity that they think is suspicious.

The Advantages:

Crime resilience information and crime updates from East Riding Council and Humberside Police.

Support to link in with crime prevention innitiatives such as Immobilise registration.

Timely updates regarding current scams and crime alerts.

Notification of any relevant funding pots for home security items for your residents.

Direct contact with your Police Community Safety Officers (PCSO).

Free NHW street signs and window stickers to send out a clear visual message.

Links with other partners such as Trading Standards, Humberside Fire Service and Age UK.

Promotion of a sense of community well-being, with the Parish Council at the centre of crime reduction.

Free training in adult safeguarding, dementia awareness and Immobilize



In the last newsletter it was interesting to see reference to the tradition of tying the churchyard gates at weddings, because I thought it had already lapsed. When present as one of the "background staff" at those events I usually unobtrusively use the back entrance so could be wrong, but please join me in the ever-entertaining game of "then and now".

First a general observation that children seem now to be little interested in such diversions. Their chief interest is the social media to be found in the palm of their hand where a mobile phone or other electronic gizmo is seemingly permanently attached. Chasing coins may also have less appeal, so maybe a £5 note? These plastic fivers can be difficult to keep under control as it is! Patience is another requirement, which can be alien to youngsters. On warm summer days such as the 3rd June, the wedding party usually take their time in the churchyard.

Which brings us to photographs. Now that nearly everyone has the means of taking instant pictures everywhere they go, wedding photography gets more sophisticated and involved. No single person can undertake the task now – it's a team, with multiple cameras, one of them on tripod for the traditional walk down the aisle shot. This must lead to an immense number of photos. We shall draw a veil (sorry) over the ones who spend an eternity taking pictures of the bride alone before she even makes it into church.
