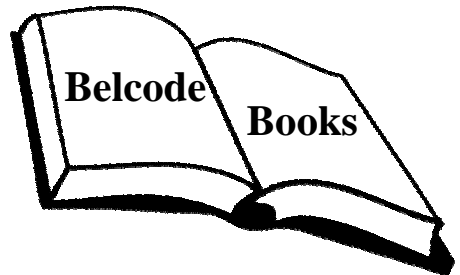

There is a service of Holy Communion each Wednesday Morning at 10.30am followed by coffee.

During our June services there will be a series of three sermons based on the 'Pilgrim' Course (a major new teaching and discipleship resource from the Church of England). We will explore 'The Eucharist' (Holy Communion) and what it means for each of us. The three titles are: 1. 'This is my body broken for you': The Eucharist as the pattern of Christian worship. 2. 'He was made known to them in the breaking of bread': looks at the intimacy we have with God in Holy Communion and how we are transformed by the encounter. 3. 'I am the bread of life': considers the notion that the whole of life is sacramental. We will round the sessions off at our united benefice service on 28th June.

## **MINUTES OF THE RUDSTON VILLAGE HALL ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING HELD ON THURSDAY 21<sup>st</sup> MAY 2015.**

The chair welcomed everyone to the meeting including the auditor, Jill Ainsworth . There were 17 people present.

**Apologies;** John and Kathleen Rawlings, Derek Tanner, Kathleen Thornton.

It was unanimously agreed that the minutes of the last AGM were a true record.

### **The Chair's Report**

Simon Rhodes said that the village hall has had a very successful year, with the solar panels continuing to bring financial gains. The hall has been redecorated and an electrician has replaced bulbs and installed new ceiling light units. The Yard Sale did very well for the village and we are looking forward to the next sale on May 24<sup>th</sup>. The Musical Allsorts made a donation to the village hall. The "Rudston Bake Off" was an enjoyable event and the chair is looking forward to defending his title at the next event!

### **Booking Secretary's Report**

Shirley Clark said that the bookings for the village hall have once more been very good.

The regular bookings during the year have been the post office and coffee shop, mother and toddler group, yoga, band practice and the craft club. During the winter months the bowls club meet weekly and the history group meet monthly .

The WI meet once a month and the parish council meet approximately once a month. The church is also a regular user of the village hall. Private parties are frequently booked, these being mainly children's parties, although we do get eighteenth and twenty firsts. There is a wedding booked in for June.

There are two caravan clubs who come each year, booking one or two nights.

The general election was an extra booking this year.

Shirley went on to say that the hall is used by the Village Hall Committee for their various fund raising events. It is hoped that the hall will continue to be used, as it is a great asset to the village.

### **Treasurer's Report**

The accounts were prepared by treasurer, Jenny Herring and audited by Jill Ainsworth, who read out the report.

In the bank at the end of April there was £3,925.19

Insurance paid was £592.03 and the decorator was paid £1,200.00.

The only outstanding large bill is for the replacement lights which is £801.41. On 21<sup>st</sup> May, £425.50 was banked and as of that date there is £30.63 in petty cash. Due to the Opus Energy Solar Panels, the electricity is costing virtually nothing and at present there is £542.40 credit from end of December 2013 to March 2015.

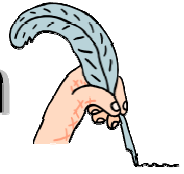

# Gardening Corner

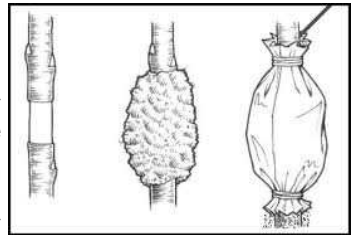
Layering is a popular way of increasing a wide range of hardy perennials, where a growth is low down on the main stem near ground level. The old fashioned Border Carnations are layered usually in July but if the new growth is advanced, the job can be done now. When layering, the



soil that is round the plant should be loose with a covering of sand spread on the surface ready to be mixed with the rest, when a hole is made to layer the stems or branches. Stems are cut into the part to be buried, n the underside in the form of a tongue, usually where a bud or joint occurs. The top end of the stem is secured to a stake and the

bent area firmly pegged down before covering with soil. Pegs of a bent piece of wire were often used for strong stems, such as Rhododendrons. Layers are left for many months before they root and woody species may take one or two years before cutting away from the parent plant and either potting up or replanting. Clematis, Wisteria and many trees or shrubs are layered by commercial firms.

Air layering on stems is also worth doing on trees or shrubs. The stems are cut under a bud or joint as for ground layering, the tongue is left open a wad of damp moss is placed in the opening, the whole thing wrapped in a piece of clear plastic and tied at each end.



As time goes on new roots develop and can be seen inside the plastic cover. Only when full of root is the layer removed from the parent and potted or planted out. Air layering was done at the RHS Wisley gardens in the late 40's, Magnolia, Rhododendrons and many trees and shrubs.

Not many of us grow asparagus, but for those who do, stop cutting the shoots by June 20th this is the date that allows the crowns to build up ready for next spring's crop. The wall gardens at Thorpe Hall and Burton Agnes used to have rows of asparagus which received a covering of salt each winter , this is because in the wild it is a native of sea shores.


