

One idea is to install a converted shipping container with seating so that spectators could enjoy watching football matches with some shelter from the elements. 


Tobias replied that he was just exploring and realised that the calf was in difficulties.

SIBLINGS QUIZ

Bob, Don, Dick and Andy were the "William Brothers" a singing 1. quartet from America who started performing in the mid 1930's. They toured in the USA and internationally, appeared in films and sang with Bing Crosby on his hit song "Swinging on a Star". The act broke up in 1951 and Andy Williams continued with a successful solo career.

Triathletes Alastair and Jonny Brownlee, born Dewsbury. At the 2. 2012 London Olympics Alastair won the Triathlon event and Jonny came third. In 2012 if Yorkshire had been treated as an independent country it would have been 12th in the medal table. In the Rio Olympics of 2016 Alastair took the gold medal and Jonny the silver, the first time in Olympic history that brothers have taken first and second place in an individual event. Olympic Triathlon distances are swim of 1.5km, bicycle route of 40km, run of 10km. In 2012 Alastair's winning time was 1; 46; 25

Edward V and Richard, Duke of York are often called "The Princes 3 in the Tower" When their father, Edward IV died in 1483 they were his only surviving sons, aged 12 and 9. Their Uncle, the Lord Protector, Richard, Duke of Gloucester lodged them in the Tower of London, supposedly in preparation for Edward's coronation. However the brothers were declared illegitimate and Richard became king. The young princes were never seen again and it is generally assumed that they were killed by Richard.

4. Ross and Norris McWhirter, sports journalists. Norris was the commentator when Roger Bannister ran the first sub 4 minute mile. One of the supporting athletes on that day was Christopher Chataway, who worked for Guinness. His boss Sir Hugh Beaver had an idea to produce a book of records. He was introduced to the twins who were well known for their knowledge of records and facts. They started work on the Guinness Book of Records in 1954, in 1955 it was Britain's best selling non fiction book, and has remained a best seller ever since.

Alan, Wayne, Merrill and Jay started singing as a barbershop 5. quartet "The Osmond Brothers" in the 1960's. They were later joined by Donny and Jimmy, when Donny joined the group became known as "The Osmonds" The peak of their popularity was from 1970 to 1975.

Chang and Eng Bunker were conjoined twins, born in 1811 in 6. Siam. For many years they toured in "freak shows and became known as "The Siamese Twins" This expression became synonymous for conjoined twins. When they stopped touring they settled in North Carolina, became American citizens, bought slaves, married local sisters and fathered 21 children. 22
