

At Christmas we read about Jesus being a refugee, about his time in Egypt which was not his home, then about moving from place to place, sometimes his choice and sometimes not. Of course, we are not oblivious to the fact there are homeless people in just about every city and town in our country and thankfully, there are many good folks who give of their time, talents and money to help this particular group of people.

Where is all this leading, we know all about this, I hear you saying. Well, maybe so but I wonder how many of you have heard of **GREEN PASTURES** - a national Christian social enterprise that provides homes for the homeless and those in most need. I recently attended our local Deanery meeting in Bridlington with an unusually large attendance of over fifty.

Wow, I hear you saying, yes, it was indeed a 'wow' meeting because we shared a presentation by 'Pastor Pete' Cunningham, founding member of Green Pastures and Carl Good, a member of the team. What they had to say seemed very much to fit with our remit as a Deanery to engage with the Diocesan objectives of reaching those we currently don't, those in poverty and the 20-40 year olds. We saw a presentation on how churches or

groups of churches can enter into partnerships with Green Pastures to provide homes for the homeless, how those houses are funded through investment, purchased, administered etc. He also added that partners would need people able to administer, offer pastoral care and carry out maintenance work. So, please consider how you may help and contact me or Glyn for further information. Above all, pray, for the work of Green Pastures.

A Concise History of our Village outreach Post Office.

Contrary to what I wrote in my editorial in the last newsletter, I am sorry to say that we still do not have a Post Office outreach service, despite the efforts of Shirley and members of the village hall committee, together with Councillor Jane Everson. It is interesting to note that the Post Office Banking Services Director recently claimed, in the Daily Telegraph, that 99% of individual customers can do their banking through the Post Office. We can't even buy a stamp from the outreach post office service. Actually, to use the word "service" is a complete misnomer, as it is anything but.

For many weeks, the service was spasmodic, at best and on many occasions staff have been unhelpful, disagreeable and uncivil. Eventually, when threats of media involvement were issued, it was decided that it was an equipment failure, causing the lack of service. This would be unacceptable if it was a village shop, but for a national organisation to allow this level of incompetence, somewhat beggars belief.

Copious amounts of individuals, purporting to be engineers inspected the equipment and eventually it was fixed!....strangely enough.... just as the reporter from Calendar News arrived to do a piece about the trials and tribulations of the Rudston Post Office Outreach Service.....or so we thought.

There was much rejoicing, as the news of this awe and wonder spread across the village. (We country bumpkins are easily pleased).

Sadly the marvel was short lived, as the following week, the full service once again could not be accessed.

We have alerted the Post Office personnel to the perceived dereliction of duty to the Rudston community.




