MIDSUMMER

At the February meeting of the group Fred Walkington gave a very interesting talk on the History of Spurn Point.



Spurn is a narrow spit which has the Humber Estuary on one side and the North Sea on the other. There have long been light-houses on ~Spurn. In 1776 the Smeaton Lighthouse was built. The circular compound which protected it is still just visible, but the lighthouse itself is no more. In 1892 it was found that the wooden piles in its foundations had rotted and this caused the lighthouse to be unstable. A new lighthouse became operational in 1895. The light was discontinued in 1985 but in 2916 the lighthouse was re-stored and became a visitor centre.

The first lifeboat station on Spurn was established in 1810 with a crew from Hull Trinity House. In 1819 cottages were built for the crew. In 1911 the RNLI took command of the lifeboat. New houses were built for the crew in 1975 but in 2012 the families left Spurn. There are now 2 crews which are on duty at the Lifeboat station in rotation.

Fred told us of some of the rescues which the Spurn Lifeboat had undertaken and especially of the Coxswain Brian Bevan.

A railway was built along Spurn Point to bring in materials for the batteries and fortifications. It was opened in 1915. Residents on Spurn would travel along the railway line using home made bogies powered by sail.

This was a fascinating talk illustrated with some wonderful pictures.

The next meeting takes place on March 26th at 7pm in Rudston Village Hall when Dr Andrew Jones will talk on Flamborough Ancient Lighthouse.

Everyone is welcome, admission is £2 and this includes tea or coffee and biscuits.
