Boynton Primary School

Last term Class Two at Boynton School learnt about the Romans and as part of the topic they enjoyed an interesting trip to a museum in York. Here is a report of the day from one of the class pupils.

The first thing we did was to group around a giant map of the Roman Empire on the floor at the entrance. A member of staff, Chris, told us that in Roman times York was called Eboracum. We then went to a room with different activities to do. Chris passed around some Roman pottery and we had to try and guess if it belonged to a rich or poor person back when it was in use. After we had finished passing around the pottery we started doing the activities in pairs or groups. The first activity we did was rebuilding the Roman Bridge. After that we started crushing some spices and grinding some flour. The next job was to make up some Roman hairstyles for some female mannequin heads

Another activity was trying on some Roman armour and playing Knuckle Bones. Trying on the armour was great fun! It was however very heavy and we nearly fell over. The next activity we did was making our own mosaics on a magnetic whiteboard and the final activity we did was doing maths with Roman Numerals. It was easy for the Year 4's because they had done Roman Numerals in maths as part of the classes' topic.

After lunch we had a really good look around the Roman part of the museum. We saw a display with a sword found in Boynton which we were fascinated by. We had also learnt at school about the Roman mosaics found at the villa in Rudston. One of the highlights in the museum was getting to walk on a mosaic which made us think about the ones we had been learning about at school. The mosaic looked very cool and felt weird on everyone's feet.

Finally, we finished looking around the museum, we all agreed it was really interesting and we had really enjoyed it. In fact it was one of the best trips ever!

Rudston Village Hall AGM held on 30th April 2019

There were 19 people present at the meeting and it was good to see some new faces. The Chair, Shirley Clark, gave her report and talked about the large amount of maintenance which has taken place this year. She also mentioned the various events which the village hall committee have organised. Shirley went on to thank the committee for all their hard work.

The booking secretary, Teresa Blofeld, listed all the various events for which the hall is used and said that there are 2 weddings booked for next year.

The treasurer, Nick Tompkin, presented the audited accounts. He reported the refurbishments cost approximately £9000 and we were awarded a grant of £4000. However we are still waiting for £2000 of this.

The solar panels pay for all the electrics which we use in the hall.

Investments were sold, yielding £1248, which was put towards the refurbishments. Nick expressed a big thank you to the coffee shop, which raised over £2000 last year.

Election of committee members

Shirley explained that the new committee is made up of representatives of village clubs and societies, as well as co-opted members. When Sir Godfrey Macdonald donated the hall to the village, this was part of the constitution. Although they have all been invited, some were unable to attend or didn't respond to the invitation.


