

A word from Rev Barbara Hodgson (priest in our benefices) following her recent visit to a residential home for physically disabled children in Zimbabwe.

### Dear Friends.

Those of you who know me will be aware that I am very rarely lost for words. However, there have been several times this has occurred since my visit to Zimbabwe.

Firstly, before I went I received generous gifts of money to take with me to use at my discretion. I was humbled & speechless by these acts of kindness. When I was over there, David and I visited a residential school for physically handicapped children and I was brought to tears at the conditions in which these children live. A Victorian workhouse came to mind, cockroaches in the bath and sinks, water tanks that leaked, electricity that was unreliable, drab walls, torn curtains, ceiling lights hanging off, do you wonder why I was speechless. To think that God's little ones were living in such conditions, distressed me so much. Money is painfully short, the children are a nuisance, they are not 'productive', so government money is next to nothing. Continued.

Thank God for the wonderful Headteacher, Margaret, and the chair of governors, Chris, both Christians and the dedicated staff, many of whom have not been paid for months. They do their very best in dire conditions to give these children some hope for the future.

After I returned to the UK I spent some time thinking how I could possibly help these children. I prayed and asked God to help me and I set myself a task to raise \$1000 to send to my sister in law, Sue. She is the Chair of the Inner wheel in Harare, capital of Zimbabwe and has dedicated her year in office to refurbish at least one dormitory at the school.

Here comes another speechless episode. I spoke about my visit at the services in the benefice and also at the Joint Benefice service in September, I did not directly ask for money but it came, lots of it. The Craft & Chat group agreed to knit cushions for the children's beds to cheer up the dormitory and they are clicking away furiously. I am well past the \$1000 I pledged, my prayer was more than answered, so thank you so very much for all the kind offers, not just of money but of prayer and encouragement. I promised my efforts would be for the year of Sue's office so upwards and onwards.

I don't mind at all these periods of speechlessness!!

### Crosslands Column

There was one of those annoying moments at the end of September. Two, actually! On the 30th, two separate items for possible inclusion in the newsletter came through by computer. Obviously, both were just too late for the October edition. The first, concerning Chimney Fires, was too long to include in full anyway, and a shortened version is included this month. The second was concerning advertising, and was left to the editor's discretion.

Regarding that first one, I had what I thought was a brainwave and suggested it could go on the village website, only to be told "no-one looks at it!" Realising how little I look at such things myself, that is no doubt true, but it does show that these modern methods aren't always the speedy efficient way of communication you might expect. A collection of wind turbines is called a Wind Farm as we know, and apparently a number of solar panels is a "Solar Array". One of those was the subject of the latest planning application to come to the parish council's attention between meetings. The location though, is at the furthest point from the village of Rudston parish, Thwing Road, so would not have visual impact. The parish council have recommended approval of the plans.

There was a reminder of the extent of the parish in that direction when a letter with attached map arrived from East Riding of Yorkshire Council. This was concerned with arrangements for next year's elections. The national ones we are all painfully aware of already, but there could possibly be parish council ones (which would be costly) if there are more applications than places. Ours are strictly non-political of course – the "common sense" party wins every time!

However, on a nice day a little more undergrowth clearance was achieved. One of the site's feathered residents was very interested in proceedings, but I'm not sure he or she was being altogether complimentary. (A robin making full use of "twitter"!)

That is intended as a "community" garden of course, and from a new report we learn that it is a thriving public house in a village which makes for "greater community spirit and stronger businesses". It may be too late for the latter in Rudston, but the open Bosville Arms should help the former. Actually, village pubs are reckoned as more important to rural life than the parish church these days, and there must be a lot of people who don't attend either!

The next parish council meeting is to be December 3rd.

Fred Leary, was stationed in Rudston, as a young soldier before being sent to fight in France. 

### **Gardening Corner**

Although we are moving towards the end of the year and nights are too dark for outdoor garden work, there is still lots of jobs to try to get done during the few weekend spaces. Soil cultivation on vacant plots was always, the spade...a good cover of manure then dig well in. Machinery seems to have taken over especially on the lighter soils of the East Riding.

Now is the time to plant tulips and any other spring flowering bulbs, also from now until the end of the year, plant all decidu-

ous trees and shrubs. So what about starting an orchard of top fruits, that have been propagated onto dwarfing rootstocks.. I mentioned apple stocks in the October issue, pears for a small tree on Quince C stock and plum varieties



on Pixy stock. There are hundreds of varieties of top fruits. When I worked at RHS Wisley, Surrey, on the National Fruit Trials, more than 300 apple and 200 plum and pear varieties on the sandy soil.

For our chalky land I would personally plant dessert apples. For early variety "Discovery" then to follow "Ellison's Orange", then later "Laxton's Superb" and instead of the world famous "Cox" plant the Yorkshire variety "Ribston Pippin".

For culinary use the "Early Victoria" is good for early apple pies. "Lord Derby" is a reliable later keeper. Then we must have the... apple "Bramley Seedling". This does well in Yorkshire even though it came from the Isle of Wight . "Howgate Wonder" what an apple!! For late eating and cooking the dual purpose "Blenheim Orange" is well worth planting.

Continued:-



For pears, plant the famous "Williams" the "Louise Bonne of Jersey" and the queen of all pears "Doyenne du Comice". A new variety that I have never grown is "Concorde", better than the long "Conference".

Now onto plums. "Victoria" still reigns top, but "Coe's Golden Drop" is a good gage type for Rudston.

New hybrid fruits are now on sale for planting, "Cot'n Candy" is 3/4 apricot 1/4 plum. Another "Flavour Supreme" is genetically 3/4 plum 1/4 apricot. I have yet to see these but they sound interesting!



Do remember to stake newly planted trees, strong winds do effect the roots until they are well established. I must remember to plant out my few Wallflowers.

PS. My famous 3 r's- Roses, Raspberries and Rhubarb all best planted in November.

### **Risk of Chimney Fires**

On 30th September (too late for the last newsletter) East Riding of Yorkshire Council issued a three-page document on "Reducing the risk of chimney fires". There was a "Chimney Fire Safety Week" at the same time, and they re-



quested that the matter should be brought to the attention of residents.

There was advice on cause, prevention, and responsibilities for maintenance, including where homes are rented. More on that can be obtained on websites: www.nacs.org.uk or www.instituteofchimneysweeps.com, but below are the main guidelines from Humberside Fire & Rescue Service.

Ensure your chimney is swept regularly.

Chimneys should be swept according to the type of fuel used:

Smokeless fuels – at least once a year

Bitumous coal - at least twice a year

Wood - quarterly when in use

Oil - once a year

Gas - once a year (by a Gas Safe regis-

tered engineer)


Keep chimneys and flues clean and well maintained When using open fires always use a fire guard, and make sure the fire is extinguished before

going to bed or leaving the house

Ensure good quality fuel is used

Never interrupt the air supply by blocking air vents or air bricks Finally, if you are unfortunate enough to suffer a chimney fire, then the chimney must be inspected thoroughly by a Certified Sweep BEFORE IT IS USED AGAIN.


