

We did manage to hold a modest meeting in October. Unusually it was an afternoon in the sports pavilion. The club's constitution states that an AGM should take place during this month every year. Though naturally no-one thought of such things as national restrictions when that was compiled many years ago. The annual luncheon has also been cancelled, but engraving of club trophies had taken place as usual, and as many as possible were presented at the end of the meeting.

As some may have noticed the bowling green is now fully enclosed. The remaining three sides now also have a more solid wooden fence. A Lissett Wind Farm grant covered much of the cost, but naturally after a season of little income the club's finances have taken a hit. More expense is expected over the winter. Consequently the decision was taken (spoiler alert to other members) to increase subscriptions next year. This will be the first increase for many years.

The Driffield League are looking forward to a normal season resuming next year, with entries already invited for their individual competitions. Those were all cancelled this year obviously, but no one from Rudston had entered any.






