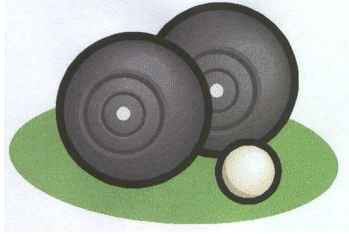
Dear Friends,

# The Corner Garden

Work has been progressing on the “Old School Garden” site. A new fence has been erected, the site has been secured with gates at the top and bottom of the site. To date, the intention has been to keep the area semi-wild and the lower area has been regularly trimmed to reduce the vigour of the larger plants.

We are currently waiting for agreement to a grant to allow us to put a path in place around the lower area, after which we would intend to start installing a few seats or picnic benches. We will also be applying for funding to create a path around the upper area next year.

On Saturday, 11 October, weather permitting, the Parish Council are holding an informal consultation day from 10am to 4pm, to get feedback on the following:

The name of the site. We believe that the most appropriate name to date has been The Corner Garden, in memory of Duncan Corner and his many years of service to the village. The layout of the area, especially where the path should be routed and where seating should be placed.

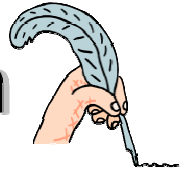
What style of seating?:

Treated softwood, hardwood, recycled plastic. Each has its own pros and cons. benches, picnic benches, single seats, etc.

What seeding / planting should be carried out, bearing in mind the aim for it to be semi-wild?The day is not just for chat, and volunteers would be welcomed to carry out further work on the area, perhaps creating the paths if the funding comes through in time. Anyone wanting to assist, please contact Bernard Warcup or Trevor Smallwood – or just turn up in work clothes!

# Crosslands Column



As some will have seen from the notice board, the parish council accounts were successfully approved at audit. The period for viewing the return in the village (by appointment with the chairman) runs until October 3rd. If anyone should be interested enough, you can even request a copy, but that is one occasion when we can, nay must, make a charge for the service. (£1.00)

In common with many other companies these days, the London accountants who performed the audit are apparently anxious that their services are appreciated, and I have a “satisfaction survey” to complete. This company were assigned to us when the system changed two years ago and the Audit Commission handed the task over, but with even the previous tight schedules being eased a little, there doesn’t seem to be anything to moan about at the moment.

At the last parish council meeting it was decided to go ahead with another speed check on the main road. At the time of writing we await a decision as to when that will take place.

The matter of dog fouling as mentioned in the Summer newsletter also came up again. A Dog Warden scheme in conjunction with neighbouring villages was outlined by the County Council, and two of our members expressed an interest on behalf of Rudston. Also at the time of writing, we wait to hear further details.

There will be a separate announcement in this newsletter about the Old School Garden, its proposed new name, and a date when everyone can come and look (and touch!)

As you would see from the county council’s monthly magazine they wanted the whole county to get involved in their dispute with the city of Hull over boundaries. Rudston Parish Council did not make a collective response, with any action in the matter being left as a personal decision by members. (cont)

The next parish council meeting is to be 15th October at the usual time and place.

# Gardening Corner

The summer crops of fruit, salads and flowers have finished in my garden, and most apples worth anything are in store. Unfortunately the cooking varieties never made a decent size, despite the rains in August. My pear varieties did produce some edible fruits.

By next month shall be thinking about planting any deciduous trees and shrubs, including fruits, so it is important to prepare the site now, working plenty of rotted organic materials into the soil and even a dusting of lime. Even on our chalky Rudston land. I shall be mentioning a few varieties of tree



fruits next month. All fruit trees are budded or grafted onto rootstocks that are of varying vigour, so that we can choose a tree that can be dwarf growing or vigorous. For example an apple grafted onto a M9 root will be very dwarfing, but if onto a M111 it will grow a lot more. These days you don't want tall standard trees that need a ladder to prune or harvest the fruit.

Soft fruits are propagated now from hardwood cuttings. Blackcurrants are made from this year's growth, the new shoots are cut off giving a stem about 12 " long. Cut the base just below a side bud and the top at 12" above a side bud also. Blacks are planted with 3/4 of their length in the ground ; a novel idea to establish a few bushes, is to put 3 cuttings together at each space leaving about 5 ft between each of the three. (cont)

Gooseberries, red and white currants have longer cuttings, about 16" with all but the top four side buds removed. And planted half into the ground, with at least 8" apart to form the main trench of the new bush . When I worked in South



Lincolnshire, I had to visit a farm, where 100 acres of blacks were grown for a well known sift drinks firm. There, all the bushes were fed in the Spring.

With a nitrogen fertilizer, followed in June by a mulch of straw to conserve soil moisture, making it easier for the pickers in July /early August. 3 varieties were grown; giants, the earliest, then Wellington XXX, then last one was Baldwin.

Sow lettuce now for growing in a frame for winter use. The old variety "All the year round" is very suitable for our area.

Runner beans were late in flowering, so it is fewer pods for the freezer. Do check even all stored produce----a bad apple or onion, soon affects the others.

Next year I intend to grow shallots again. They seem popular on the TV cooking programmes.

Let's hope for a reasonable time, weather-wise, for the remaining weeks of this year.

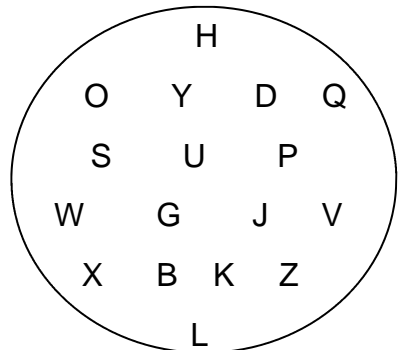
