Thank you to everyone who sent their good wishes and get well thoughts following my stay in Hull Royal and Castle Hill hospitals. I dislocated my hip and also fractured some bones, necessitating a two week stay in hospital. It has NOT been a hip replacement... too young apparently!! There has to be no weight bearing on my right side for 6 weeks, so I hop around using a zimmer frame; this caused our youngest grandson to say, "you look like a rabbit, Gran". Car riding is out, because of risk of damage, getting in and out. Another grandson asked if I was really bored. sitting in the same chair or lying in bed in the lounge, to which I replied that I am quite happy with my kindle, my IPad, and the Daily Telegraph. Perhaps I was born to be absolutely bone idle!! Seriously though, I am lucky to have Nick who is looking after me so well and family who are regular visitors. Nick has made a ramp and wheels me out in a wheel chair, kindly leant by Albert our neighbour. On one such outing we had a ceremonial burning of the beautiful blue shoes which were, due to their extremely smooth soles, responsible for my fall. I am ashamed to say that I do make guite a fuss as I'm frightened of falling out of it. I have been assured that this won't happen and am not a cartoon character. We have practiced going to the village hall, so that I can attend the committee meeting this week. My hospital stay ensured that we have missed out on lots of events.....a wedding, trip to the races and a 3 week holiday to Lanzarote which we had booked the day before my accident. I was really upset to have missed my first Parish Council meeting, but I will be at the next, in or out of a wheel chair! I have an Xray booked for next Friday and hope that at least I will be permitted to stand on two feet.

I would just like to say that whilst I have encountered a very small number of NHS staff who are a disgrace to the profession, the majority of staff are wonderful; completely dedicated often working in short staffed and difficult circumstances.

Here at school we have been back for 2 weeks (at the time of writing) and our new school year has started really well.

After saying goodbye to 15 children in July who were moving onto secondary school, we have welcomed a total of 18 full-time new-starters, as well as another new group of children into nursery. Everybody is getting used to new classrooms and new teachers and everyone is making new friends.

We officially welcomed our new starters with what is now our traditional September Church service, when our oldest children shared their 'Recipe for a Happy School', our Year 4 & 5 pupils shared their thoughts on changes that had happened since they were new starters themselves, and a blessing was shared by Rev. Gardening Corner

At the time of writing these few notes, we have the back end feeling, still a bit of harvest to get in, but by now it should be just about all over and seed time for some crops.

Spring cabbage plants can be planted in the final guarters, with the usual protection given to keep wood pigeons off.

It's time to planting any deciduous trees or shrubs, in particular fruit trees. There are so many varieties of both cooking and dessert. I have tested many of them over the years to find those best suited to our soil and climate. There are naturally new varieties popping up all the time to consider, but my experience does not include these. I tend to go for the

older well tried ones.

Apples must come first, for my apple pies the old Early Victoria is number one, followed closely by Lord Derby and to follow,



who could miss out the world famous Bramley Seedling for keeping and cooking. However this must have other varieties near in order to pollinate it's flowers. Howgate Wonder is the best for this as it doesn't make such a big tree.

For dessert apples I planted Ellison's Orange for the first fruits, then Laxton's Fortune, and the famous Cox's Orange Pippin (in a sheltered place), but for a pale dessert our own Yorkshire variety Ribston Pippin is the best, with the all rounder Blenheim Orange a good second choice.

Modern trees are sold on more dwarfing root stocks and the labels should give the rootstock and it's vigour as well as it's variety name.

More next month... beware we have reached the time of year when a ground frost can occur! Dick Robinson

Crosslands Column

Things got a little mixed up last month. Though that was quite understandable and is certainly no criticism of the editor (and husband!) who should be congratulated for producing the usual comprehensive newsletter in adverse circumstances. The two articles contained in this column were intended to be separate, and one of them was nothing to do with the parish council of course. Though there has been a response to that – thank you. What happened with the dog fouling one was that our warden Mr. Chris Shanks had been given the same article for the village at the meeting he had attended. Quite rightly that was the one which was printed, without any Clerk's comments.

As far as we know, the county council are going ahead with their Green Open Homes idea, but as some would notice it was being compromised even before it appeared in print. The government withdrawal of subsidies on solar panels must make them less attractive at least.

Another government decision from a while ago is just starting to take effect at parish council level. Not the misleading "more power" spiel, but the "more transparency" one. It entails more parish council information, especially financial, being posted on websites. Rudston already meets some of the requirements, but others are needed. An immediate change is that I am now required to publish the full agenda which members receive before meetings. So a few days ("3 clear") before the next meeting which is on 14th October that should appear on the website. Copies also have to go on notice boards, so apologies in advance if these inevitably larger pieces of paper temporarily cover up other notices. There will no longer be need for the basic meeting notice which used to appear 7 days beforehand. Accounts changes are taking place a little more gradually, but one thing that already happens is the listing of payments and receipts in the Minutes of each meeting.

Meanwhile, the auditor's return for the last annual accounts has been received back with a "clean bill of health". It is available for viewing at the home of the chairman by appointment until 9th October.

Finally – buses. It will probably be no surprise that the Acklams bus service is proving uneconomical, but that contract continues until next February. However, East Riding Council wish to keep some sort of service going after that and have already produced a proposed new timetable. For Rudston (and the other villages concerned) this would provide a chance for shopping, in Bridlington on Wednesdays and Driffield on Thursdays. The Saturday service would be discontinued. Proposed timings are: Wednesday, dep. Rudston 10 a.m., arr. Brid. 10.20, return 1 p.m. arr. 1.20; and Thursday, dep. Rudston 9.35 a.m., arr. Driffield 10.15, return 1 p.m., arr. 1.40. (There are a number of other villages to take in with that one). The Bridlington service will no longer start in Driffield, but (for some strange reason) Ruston Parva. The parish council will need to make any response on this soon after the next meeting, so if anyone has any comments please contact any member before then. (Or even come along to the meeting of course!)



If you would like us **NOT** to call at your house **please display** this page in your window or on your door. This may also be handy for the 31st October if you would prefer 'trick or treaters'



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


