These monies have been split between the Playing Field (two-thirds) and the Newsletter (one-third). This is another good year, however the amount raised for the village has continued to reduce as can be seen below.

The Playing Field and the Newsletter are great assets to the village, but as with anything, costs continue to rise year on year to keep them running. We would therefore ask anyone who is currently not in the village bingo to please consider supporting this form of fundraising. You don't need to even leave the house to participate as everything is delivered to your door each week.

It costs 10p per book per week to play, so if you're willing to support the village to the sum of, say, 50p a week, then you will receive 5 books to play with. All you're aiming for is a full house, ie all numbers ticked off, to win a share of the cash prize of £40 that is split between all winning tickets. We also have another cash prize of £50 for having all five snowball numbers on one ticket – this will be explained in more detail to any new players.

A year as Headteacher

Thank you for the invitation to write an article for the Rudston Newsletter. I thought I would start by writing a short overview of the last year at school and

let you know the direction the school is heading in.

This has been my first year as a Head Teacher and as a Head of two schools has honestly been one of the hardest, most challenging and exciting years of my life. The opportunity to lead a school through change and make it the best it can be is a magical one. Boynton Primary School is a special place, a nurturing environment where every one works together for the betterment of the children's education. That has been a welcome relief to me as the whole community has jumped on board with my vision for the school.

As I'm sure you are aware, we had a very successful Ofsted visit last year in which the inspector was very complimentary. Two points from that inspection were very memorable. The first being that he had never been to a school during an inspection where staff and the children were so relaxed, laughing and supportive of each other. The second was that there were no specific objectives for the school to improve on following the inspection other than to keep doing what we are doing. I'd never seen this before and it was a welcome acknowledgement of the hard work of the school and its community.

Of course, we have many plans in place and the school has secured funding to do some building work as some of the buildings are looking a little tired. We are creating a forest school classroom and keeping our fingers crossed that in the future we can expand to have our own nursery. We have made links with a charity called 'The Children's University' who are helping us to create more opportunities for trips and learning experiences for our children. This year, we are aiming to continue the hard work and have engaged with a programme called 'Investors in Pupils.'

This will help us to develop the 'soft skills' of our pupils and encourage them to look beyond their immediate surroundings to see how we can work better as a community. Our Governing Body are going from strength to strength and we now have various members of the community helping us to broaden our curriculum and provide opportunities for learning. We hope in the future (with your support) to make the roads safer outside of the school, improve our internet access and bring our children out to experience learning in the surrounding towns and villages. If you would like to contact us, we have an open-door policy and would be more than happy to talk to you about ideas or suggestions for the future. I will also see if we can engage our children with providing articles, photos or work for the Rudston Newsletter.

The Rudston History Group's autumn season opened on Thursday the 27th September when Mr Chris Bonnet gave a fascinating presentation on Bridlington heroes of the First World War to a large audience. Mr Bonnet told us that his interest was first taken when he found that his Mother in law had lost a brother in the war.

Mr Bonnet had brought along many interesting things to show. There were pictures of the soldiers who had come from Bridlington; a tin which had contained cigarettes – a Christmas present from Princess Mary to each person in the forces; useful and decorative things which ingenious tommies had made out of shell cases....

The presentation finished with slides of graveyards, memorials and battle sites in France and Belgium.

While we enjoyed refreshments there was a chance to look at information Frederick and Michelle Stephens had researched about men from Rudston who had died in the war. These documents will be on show in the church.

The next meeting of the History Group will be on Thursday the 25th October, when the speaker will be John Walker. The subject will be an illustrated talk about Rudston in the 1800's based on the information in the Rudston Constable's account book, which has just been rediscovered. A fascinating subject full of facts we didn't know about our early village. Come along and be surprised

FLY TIPPING

There seems to have been a lot of fly tipping lately. We live in a beautiful area and it is terrible to see it spoilt by piles of fly tipped rubbish.

Fly tipping is

UNSIGHTLY.....POSSIBLY DANGEROUS..... EXPENSIVE

Did you know that collecting fly tipped waste costs the East Riding of Yorkshire Council £320,000 a year and that disposing of that waste costs a further £30,000. That is a lot of money out of the Council's budget; think what it could pay for if there was no such thing as fly tipping!

You are responsible for the proper disposal of waste from your property. You can use your wheelie bins, take waste to the recycling site at Carnaby, or use the Council's bulky waste collection service. For more information tel 01482 393939 or visit www.eastriding.gov.uk.

If you pay someone to take waste away for you check that he is a registered waste carrier, ask to see his licence. Beware of people who are calling door to door or advertising on Facebook. If you are suspicious of someone who calls without appointment offering to remove waste report this to the Council. If someone takes waste away for you and then fly tips it, it is your responsibility and you can be fined.

If someone is doing work at your house check how he will dispose of the waste. He may be a registered waste carrier, or use an industrial waste disposal company. In either case the tradesman should be able to produce paperwork which shows how the waste is disposed of.

If you find fly tipped waste – report to the Council on 01482 393939 or www.eastriding.gov.uk giving as much detail as possible. Do not touch the waste.

If you see someone fly tipping – do not confront them. Get as much detail as possible: where and when it happened, vehicle details including description and registration; how much waste and what it is. Then pass these details to the Council.
