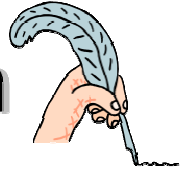

In my quarterly Clerks' magazine was an article about a parish councillor in Oxfordshire who had died after 45 years service. Realising that Duncan Corner had "beaten" that, I decided to pay a visit to Beverley Archives and determine exactly how long he had served. We can only add "half" to his 46 years though, as his first meeting was April, 1967. (Just a few months before the record here begins). However, I have submitted our "story" to the magazine because there was another interesting aspect. Duncan was appointed to the parish council when his father, Sam, had to step down due to ill health having himself served 39 years, some of them combined with the role of Clerk. (Much easier in those days!) So, last October was the first time for at least 85 years that there has been no Corner on the parish council, and for a few years there were two when Don was a member too.

The Oxfordshire councillor was being remembered by having a community award re-named in his honour, and installation of a bench. Hopefully, we can manage something for Duncan.

Thanks to the Bosville Arms, the recycling facilities (as well as the whole village) have received a much needed boost lately. An illustration is that our payment for the first three months of the year was £28, but for April to June it was £238. We have also put in a request for more frequent emptying of containers to try and avoid the embarrassment of over-flowing.

A lady from the village was nominated for, and won, a county award for her excellent work in the field of grant applications etc. Having some idea how complicated that can be, I for one am full of admiration.

Posters were placed in August for a charity, Penny Brohn Cancer Care. Penny was one of the founders of Bristol Cancer Care many years ago, and it was renamed after her death. They are now extending their work alongside hospitals to help cancer sufferers and their “close supporters” throughout the country. # Gardening Corner

Harvest started rather early in the garden. By the end of July, the onions were ready for lifting and drying. The summer varieties of raspberries were finished and the tops of the potatoes were dead, with the attack of the dreaded potato blight disease. On the farms, potatoes are regularly sprayed with fungicides, to keep this problem at bay. On most gardens and allotments, little or no spraying is done. By now, my early apple varieties should be more than ready. The dry spell in July had an effect on fruit size and I hope the heavy rains we had in early August will put a bit of size on all my varieties, especially Bramley and Harrogate Wonders.



Summer raspberries can be pruned, removing all canes that fruited, leaving the best new ones for next years' crop. Autumn fruiting kinds are pruned in January or February next year, by cutting all canes down to ground level. All raspberry varieties are fed in the new year, by giving a dressing of nitrogen, sulphate of ammonia in March is about the right time.

Plant out the spring cabbage now and cover to keep the birds at bay. Nursery firms layer young shoots of deciduous shrubs this month. These are cut away from the parent plants, next September and containerised for sale during the winter.

I am reminded that specially prepared bulbs of hyacinths are on sale for planting in bowls of peat to flower at Christmas. These are then kept in the dark and cool for a month or two, to allow fruiting, but once new shoots appear, they are then brought into a cool but light place. No forcing in a hot room at this stage.



Finally, September is an ideal month for sowing grass seeds,. For a good lawn sow 2 ounces of seeds to every square yard and lightly cover.

More next month about new fruit trees.

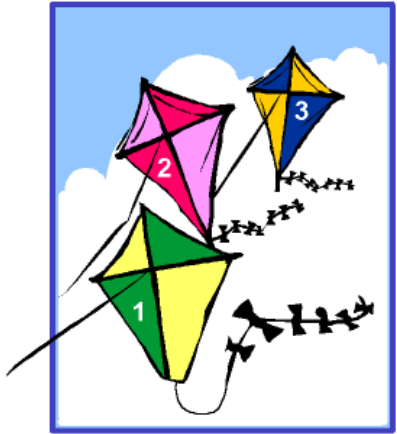

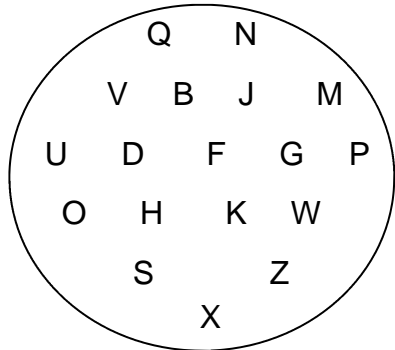
