

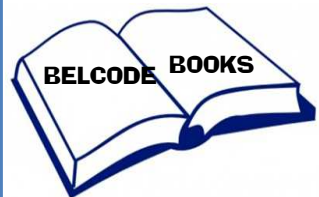

September is a quiet month in the church calendar but there are a couple of things happening to tell you about. First; we are starting a 'Pilgrim course' in September. It is a chance to explore the Christian faith in an informal, friendly and open way. We'll look at the Lords Prayer as a way into the Christian gospel, a guide to our own prayers and a way of deepening our relationship with God. If you want to know more visit the Pilgrim website which has loads of information: www.pilgrimcourse.org It doesn't matter whether you are new to church or have been a Christian for many years and want to visit the roots of your faith again. The course assumes very little understanding or knowledge of the Christian faith and all are truly welcome. It will be at 2pm in the afternoon starting on 14th September initially at the home of Margaret Reed in Rudston and run weekly for six weeks. If that doesn't fit for you we will also have one in Kilham in the evening (starting on Monday 12th September, 7pm) at the home of Rob Gobel, Chantry Meadows, Kilham. Either call me or see Margaret for more information.

The second thing to mention is that you may have seen the scaffolding go up and the activity around church. We are having some fairly substantial repairs to the roof, guttering and stonework (the joy of maintaining a medieval building!). It's taken a few years to plan and get to this point (including making sure no bats are upset or harmed during the work) but when the job is done the church should be sound and water-tight for many years to come.

We're back round to the end of year for the village bingo and this year we have managed, after costs, to raise £950 to be shared equally between the playing field and newsletter. This is a fantastic amount, but unfortunately the support for the bingo is reducing and we are just short of £150 down on the previous year, as can be seen when comparing last two years income.

Defibrillator for Rudston

The Parish Council are pleased to announce that after what seems an inordinate time waiting for confirmation of funding, we now have sufficient funding (courtesy of Lissett Wind Farm Community Fund, East Riding Council Local Grant and Parish Council resources, to go ahead with the purchase and installation of a defibrillator. This will be sited in the old phone box on Middle Street.

The defibrillator will be in a secure box which will need a code to get in. This code will be known to the 999 service, so when anyone calls an ambulance, they should inform you of the code to access the defibrillator.

Given the distance to A&E departments from Rudston, this could be a life saver for anyone who has a heart attack.

The defibrillator and associated support package will come from a charity, Community Heartbeat Trust, who work with Yorkshire Ambulance Service and BT, to provide a complete, resilient and sustainable solution and which will include the following services:

- cPAD defibrillator and steel cabinet

- WebNos cPAD internet based Governance System

- Post Event Trauma Counselling

- AED Signage

- Rescuer Safety Kit (Hi-Vis Jacket and torch)

- Community Cardiac Arrest Response Seminar (For as many people as necessary)

- Complete policies and procedure pack

- VETSfone service

- Free electricity to keep the defibrillator charged

VETSfone is a Community Heartbeat Trust service that provides a Volunteer Emergency Telephone System. This will provide an emergency phone in the kiosk, which is important in Rudston as the mobile phone coverage is so patchy. It will allow trained volunteers to be contacted automatically by anyone who needs the defibrillator.

A budget will be allocated for maintenance and replacement parts. The costs of these vary but generally, every two years (and after a rescue) pads will need replacing at approximately £30 a set and the battery every 4 years at £166-195 depending on model of AED.

Once the defibrillator is installed, we will set up a training session for anyone who would like to know how to use one. Neil

Seating for the Corner Garden

We have also been informed that we were successful in a bid to the Caythorpe Gas Environmental Fund for a grant to provide seating and signage for the Corner Garden. This funding will be used to purchase signs for the lower and upper gates to the garden and three benches and one picnic table made from recycled plastic. We chose recycled plastic as that reduces maintenance and should provide a long life for the seating.

Hopefully the seating will be in place by the end of October.

He also plays and sometimes conducts Buckrose Concert Band.

Formed specially for this year's Musical Allsorts the trio (Martin, Bob and Margaret) is making its debut (and possibly final) performance. All three are members of the Buckrose Band and U3A orchestra.

Martin (French Horn) is an accomplished player is a member of Hessle Sinfonia. Bob (euphonium) took up the instrument only a few years ago, following retirement.

Margaret played the French horn briefly at school, but the instrument spent a significant time in the bus station lost property office, having being left on the school bus on several occasions. She was inspired to try again, after retirement.

They have had to arrange everything to suit their needs, as there are very few arrangements for this combination of instruments.

Crosslands Column

“And now the end is near”! Welcome to the last Crossland’s Column, because there seems no doubt this time that we have a new Clerk to Rudston Parish Council. Jennifer Hobson from Hunmanby received formal approval at the August meeting, and has also taken on Burton Agnes as outlined previously. She is a newcomer to the role (as was I all those years ago) so I am continuing to the end of September to try and ensure a smooth hand-over. Jennifer fortuitously applied on the morning of the last meeting and came along that evening. She wasn’t put off by what she saw!

We were pleasantly surprised that Councillors Evison and Owen also turned up to the June meeting. There was also a letter of introduction from Cllr. Paul Lisseter who has taken over from the late Margaret Chapman.

Dates of parish council meetings for the remainder of the year were agreed. Unfortunately the October date was later found to be inconvenient, and has now been changed to the 12th of that month. The last of the calendar year was set for 14th December. Your new clerk will confirm or otherwise in due course.

The recycled plastic furniture for the Corner Garden was approved, and should be appearing any time soon. It has also raised the question of footpath access alongside the main road again, and that together with the rear steps to the churchyard, is being looked into. At the August meeting the parish council were gratefully surprised to learn of a donation of £350 to come from three village young people who had completed a school initiative involving a 20 mile bike ride. Apparently they specifically requested that it should go to the Corner Garden project. Thank you.

Following changes in policy regarding traffic speed checks the one expected in Rudston last year never took place and now appears unlikely. It is no longer direct police responsibility, and Rudston is regarded as “not meeting certain conditions” (which unofficially probably means no fatalities). Anyway, the government is being blamed for the situation and the parish council were advised to contact their M.P. if they wished to take it further!

The reference to Fracking in the last newsletter was overtaken by events before it even appeared in print. Short notice was received of a meeting to be held in Kilham, and a further (separate) meeting on the subject took place in Bridlington in August. No reports from either.

Also too late for the last newsletter was news on bus services, and notice of that was displayed on the notice board. A mobile information unit was deployed by E.R.Y.C. and Rudston happened to be one of the places visited on its first day, which was 2nd. August. Nothing further to report from that.

Finally some advance news: the parish council will cease to receive payments for recycling after 30th September. This refers to the Burton Fleming Road glass containers, which will remain in place for a while after that, but the Parish Council would appreciate a bumper month if possible. As reported previously we are "in debt" under this scheme, so it would be nice to break even before it finishes!

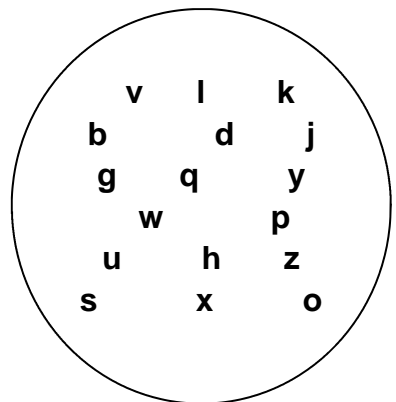
