Your Healthcare, Your Record, Your Number

Do you know your NHS Number? Do you know where your NHS Number is or where to find it? Do you use your NHS Number?

Each NHS Number is specific to an individual person. Like you it is unique and stays with you for life. It is the only National Unique Patient Identifier available for healthcare, which means it is literally the link between you and all your healthcare records.

An NHS number is a digit string of numbers - you can find this on your medical card given to you when you registered with a GP. If you don't know your number, you can write to Patient Data Services, NHS East Riding of Yorkshire, Health House, Grange Park Lane, Willerby, HU10 6DT.

Why is your NHS Number important?

An NHS number used in a patients care pathway, links all the patients records together, creating a fuller, more accurate health history for that patient.

Having an NHS number assists in the reduction of patient misunderstanding.

It helps reduce the creation of multiple records for a patient. Multiple records fracture a patients history across many files. This therefore makes it more difficult for a clinician to treat a patient efficiently.

Healthcare staff can find patient records more easily and share them safely with other people caring for the patient.

NHS staff will begin to ask for NHS numbers more often, so we would like to remind you to keep yours in a safe place that you have easy access to. Visit<u>www.eastridingofyorkshire.nhs.uk/</u><u>NHSNumber</u> for more information.

Nature News

The winter period has produced a new record for the area when a bittern was disturbed during a local shoot. The bittern is a very scarce breeding bird in this country with no known local breeding sites. It is about the size of a heron, mottled and brown streaked, which stays motionless with its bill pointing skywards to imitate the reeds and other tall vegetation in its waterside habitat, from which it hunts its prey of mainly small fish. On the same day but in a different area a water rail, an occasional but not regular winter visitor to this area, was reported. This is another very secretive species, which hides among waterside vegetation. This species may be more common than is realized due to its skulking habits.

Other winter visitors have included the brambling, looking like a chaffinch gone wrong, and both snipe and woodcock, resident but supplemented by immigrants from the continent escaping the worst of the continental weather. A malnourished kestrel was brought in, suffering from a lack of prey, mice etc which were burrowing underneath the snow preventing the kestrel to from seeing them. It was fed with small pieces of meat by a carer and released a few days later in good health

Buzzards have been regularly reported patrolling the area and do not seem to have suffered from lack of prey opportunities and the sparrow-hawk population also seem to be finding prey regularly. There have been mixed bands of tits with blue tits and great tits happily mixing with coal and long tailed tits going from feeder to feeder on a circular tour of the area, it has been the finches that have been scarce.

Another unusual visitor has been the snow bunting, normally confined to the coastline, but small flocks have been seen where ploughing or general groundwork has been possible and have been seen where black-headed gulls have followed the plough

The poor weather has seen foxes appearing in local gardens as well as regular reports of stoats in the same areas.
