Mortgage Basics

For most of us our mortgage represents the most significant financial arrangement in our lives, allowing us to buy the property of our dreams and continue to live in our homes for as long as we choose to do so.

Whatever the marketing men tell us, there are only two basic types of Mortgage; **Interest Only** and **Capital & Interest** also known as **Repayment**. Looking at the first of these, an interest only mortgage allows for the lender to advance a sum of money to the borrower on which the borrower makes a monthly payment to the lender of only interest on the sum borrowed. This means that at the end of the mortgage term the borrower will still owe the full amount originally borrowed. So if you borrow £50,000 over 25 Years, you will still owe £50,000 at the end of the term. It remains the borrower's responsibility to repay the loan at this time.

A Repayment mortgage on the other hand means that the borrower is required to make a monthly payment to the lender which consists of interest on the sum borrowed AND a repayment of part of the amount originally borrowed. In this way the borrower owes a little less every month such that by the end of the term the mortgage balance has reduced to zero. If the borrower maintains the monthly payment for the agreed term, the mortgage balance is GUARANTEED to be zero. So if you borrow £50,000 over 25 years, you will owe £0 at the end of the term.

Once you've selected your basic mortgage, you must then decide on the type of mortgage product you require from the many deals available:

The starting point, for most lenders, is the **Standard Variable Rate** (SVR). This is the rate of interest payable, determined by the lender at their discretion. The interest rate may fall or rise, usually as a result of changes to the **Bank of England Base Rate** (BBR) as determined by the Bank of England Monetary Policy Committee. This means that your monthly mortgage payment will increase or reduce as the SVR varies.

A **Discounted** Rate Mortgage allows for the interest rate payable to be discounted by a set percentage from the lender's SVR for a specific period. Even though the discount applies, as the SVR varies your monthly mortgage payments will continue to rise and fall.

A **Tracker** Mortgage allows for the interest rate payable to track the BBR (or some other similar benchmark) and is either a set percentage above the BBR or a set percentage below the BBR, for a pre-determined period. Again, as the BBR varies your monthly payments will rise or fall accordingly.

A **Fixed** Rate Mortgage means that the interest rate is fixed for a pre-determined period of time. This means that during the term that the fixed rate applies, your monthly mortgage payment will not change at all, even if the SVR and/or BBR vary.

A **Cap** or **Collar** may apply to any mortgage, the Cap being an upper limit and the Collar being a lower limit. In the event of a mortgage with a CAP, your monthly mortgage payment will increase and reduce in line with changes to the interest rate. Once the interest rate hits the Cap there will be no more increases to your monthly mortgage payment whilst the interest remains above the Cap. The same is true of the Collar when interest rates are falling. Your monthly mortgage payment will continue to rise and fall as interest rates change until the rate falls below the Collar, in which eventuality your monthly mortgage payment will remain at the rate determined by the collar, until rates rise above this level.

As there is such a bewildering array of different mortgage deals available it is absolutely essential to seek advice from a competent **Mortgage Adviser**. However, one mortgage adviser may not be the same as another. If you choose to seek advice from your bank, the bank's adviser will be able to choose a mortgage from those marketed only by the bank. A very limited choice when compared to those available in the wider mortgage market. Your mortgage adviser may be 'tied' to a panel of lenders allowing them to select a mortgage from a pre-determined panel of lenders, not as limited as a bank adviser, yet still restricted to those lenders on the panel. Ideally you should seek advice from an **Independent 'Whole of market' Adviser** who will be able to select a mortgage from all available lenders and thus ensure that you receive the mortgage that best meets your circumstances, not one that is merely a close fit.

Local Author

You may be interested to know that local author, John Sugden, of Middle Street, has just published a novel called 'Sing Shenandoah for Me.'

The novel is John Sugden's fifth book having, written psychology books in the past, a children's book, and many academic articles. John Sugden is also a published and prize winning poet. In 2003, his verse play about the Hull whaling ship, the 'Diana,' beset with ice in the Bering Sea in 1857, was performed at Waterstones, Scarborough, to commemorate National Poetry Day. In 2007, John, together with fellow members of Scarborough Poetry Workshop, was a guest reader at the International Poetry Festival in Cortona, Italy.

The novel is set in the 1960s in the West Yorkshire conurbation, and features five years in the turbulent relationship of a young couple. The publishers have said of the story, that it '...weaves the jealousies of courtship and the strains of marriage into a love that, confronted with an impossible decision, even death cannot end, tying us into it with a jolt that makes us rethink love, life and success.' John also awaits the publication of a second novel (sometime in 2010) called 'Winter' concerning the death of a psychoanalyst.

Yorkshire Day

On 1st August I attended the Yorkshire Day celebrations at Hessle, at the invitation of the Chairman of the East Riding of Yorkshire Council and Hessle Town Council.

The event began with a service at All Saints Church. During an amusing but thought provoking sermon, the Vicar told us that although Yorkshire had not been mentioned in the Bible the East Riding had, when the story is told of wise men coming from the East Riding

After the service the Civic party, resplendent with mayoral chains, and other guests, were led by the Town Crier to an area in the Square, where the Yorkshire Declaration was read in Modern English by Councillor Christopher Matthews, Chairman of ERYC. The Declaration was then read in Old English, Latin, Old Norse, and Yorkshire dialect.

YORKSHIRE DECLARATION OF INTEGRITY

- I, Christopher Matthews, being resident in the East Riding of Yorkshire declare:
 - That Yorkshire is three Ridings and the City of York with these Boundaries of 1134 years standing;
 - That the address of all places in these Ridings is YORKSHIRE;
 - That all persons born therein or resident therein and loyal to the Ridings are Yorkshire men and women;
 - That any person or corporate body which deliberately ignores or denies the aforementioned shall forfeit all claim to Yorkshire status.



Nature News

The summer period has again been quiet on the bird front but a pair of buzzards have tried to breed, and it seems that they have been successful. Barn owls have also bred in at least two separate sites round the village. There have been reports of a hen harrier hunting for a few days but he has moved on. It is known to be a male because of the substantially grey plumage. A green sandpiper, presumably a failed breeder, has been seen in muddy patches by the Gypsey Race but no other returning migrant birds have been noted. On the other hand, the swifts, which were visible and noisy all summer, have almost, but not completely, left us for more southerly climes.

A couple of badgers have been reported as road casualties but there have been several reports of live badgers seen in many areas surrounding the village. Bats, almost exclusively pipistrelles, have been recorded by the East Yorkshire bat group at several sites in and around the village. Interestingly, they have deserted one regular breeding roost, had a temporary move to another site in the village, and have returned to the known site after breeding has finished. It was not until the beginning of July when the first reports of hedgehogs were mentioned, and it appears that the creature is becoming much scarcer.

The immigration of painted lady butterflies, reported a couple of months ago, gradually moved inland and the species has been recorded all over Yorkshire in substantial numbers. There are still several to be seen and some of them are fresh specimens suggesting that they have produced another generation locally. The gatekeeper butterfly is only seen locally from time to time but there have been a substantial number of sightings this summer. After reporting earlier that moth numbers were low, there has been a substantial increase in numbers of the commoner species but only one new moth has been added to our local list, when a light brocade was trapped in July.

Crosslands Column

There will have been a parish council meeting on 19th August, but with the large amount to relate this time, only anything urgent arising from that will be included here. The next meeting is arranged for 7th October.

The main topic this month (taking up most space anyway) is the Big Lottery Fund. We are asked by councillors Evison and Owen to highlight this, as either the Parish Council itself or individuals in the village can apply. It consists of various programmes as follows: Big Awards for All featuring "small" grants up to £10,000; Changing Spaces, which has already been running two years through 5 award partners; Community Spaces, run by Groundwork U.K. since March, 2008; Community Sustainable Energy, run by the Building Research Establishment since April, 2008; Heroes Return 2, providing funding for any 2nd World War veteran with wife or carer wishing to re-visit the battlegrounds; Reaching Communities, helping those in need (e.g.-mental health); Village S.O.S. launched on 1st June in conjunction with the B.B.C., but as this is for anyone with ideas for a new business should be approached with extreme caution in our case! I can, of course, go into greater detail for anyone interested in any of these, but there are the inevitable web-sites available. The e-mail is: general.enquiries@biglotteryfund.org.uk.

East Riding village communities are being asked to be 'on the alert' for their local church, following thefts of lead from Roos and Fridaythorpe. Rudston is lucky in having nothing accessible worth pinching, but some criminal low-life could still make an expensive mess in finding out.

The next stage of the Low Caythorpe Gas plans is due to begin 7th September with a "3D Seismic Survey". This involves small explosive charges in boreholes around the area. Any landowners affected will be notified and disruption kept to a minimum. I was going to go into more detail, but the confirmation from their surveyors specifically says that 'land within the village' will be excluded. Apparently there should be no more than a 'dull thud' to be heard in any case, and it seems any general disruption is more likely to be from their vehicles moving about, which when on the road will have orange rotating lights.


Apologies for the recent disappearance of the Paper Recycling Bin. It

seems that the Council's contractors' driver decided that it was in an awkward position because of an overhead power line, so as is the way these days, simply took it away and left us without one at all. A Council representative subsequently met our chairman on site and agreed that this was pretty poor. She was to see about having it returned and also to investigate the possibility of having a plastic bottle container installed. At the time of writing we await further developments.


